### A Storm.

FORT DODGE, Iowa, June 24.—The train  
dispatcher reports that Emmetburg,  
county seat of Paola, Alta County, was  
blown to pieces this morning by a tornado,  
and over one hundred people killed. The  
Illinois Central and Chicago and North-  
Western train were blown from the track.  
The Milwaukee and St. Louis road was  
wrecked. There is a washout at North  
Forest City, and it is reported that three  
or four more towns in that locality were  
blown to pieces. The wires are all down.  
It is impossible to get more news at present.

FATAL ACCIDENT ON THE GREAT WESTERN  
RAILWAY.—On Thursday a fatal accident  
took place on the Great Western Railway,  
Hamilton, near the eastern city limits.  
The express was five minutes behind time,  
and was running at high speed. Approaching  
the Sawyer Works the engineer observed  
the south switch open, and knowing  
that the train could not be stopped till it  
smashed into some freight cars, quick as a  
flash called to the fireman:—"Switch is  
open—jump," at the same time reversing  
the engine and putting on the air brake.  
The fireman jumped to the south side and  
the engineer to the north, the latter receiving  
such injuries that he died shortly after  
one o'clock. The engineer, whose name is  
John Bradley, lived in Horton street, London.  
He leaves a wife and family. The  
fireman, Thomas Bell, also of London, es-  
caped without very serious injury, being  
knocked senseless. The train in running  
into the freight cars split the first car in  
two, the debris flying in every direction.  
The engine is a wreck. The smoke-jack,  
coupling, caboose, &c., are all gone.  
The tender is a wreck. The passenger  
cars all kept the track except the first,  
which jumped toward the main track and  
ran over engine. Bradley, or he would
