WAR IN EGYPT.

London, July 5.—Sir Charles Dilke stated in the House of Commons that further instructions had been sent to Admiral Seymour with regard to the armament of the forts of Alexandria which would meet any contingency.

The constitution of the first army corps is now settled. Fifteen thousand men of the corps go from England to Egypt and the rest from India.

The War Office has ordered the preparation of tubular wells, capable of supplying two and a half million gallons of water daily.

Three thousand Egyptians under General Yussuf attacked the false prophet and were defeated. They lost 2,000 men, four guns, and 3,000 rifles.
