HAIL.—During the past few days a great many parts of Western Ontario have been visited by very heavy thunder storms accompanied by hail. In this town only a few large hailstones fell, but other places report 3 or 4 inches of hail upon the ground, for hours after the storm. In Solihull four or five hundred acres had everything beaten down, and the crop on one farm almost destroyed; we also hear that parts of Preston had similar visitations. Near Alliston and Agincourt Orangefield over three inches are said to have fallen. In Guelph township a terrible storm almost destroyed vegetation along a strip near two miles wide and during the storm it was so dark that people could not see twenty yards.

We hope the people in the back part of Glenelg will see the benefits arriving from having Divine service convenient, and, no matter what their creed may be, turn in and help to put this church on a good financial basis so that the services of a good minister may be regularly secured in future.
