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CANADIAN ITEMS.

A new siding is being laid at the Dundalk Station. Norwich has added \$318,885 worth of buildings to its real estate value during the year.

The little four-year-old son of William Farrell accidentally fell into a cistern at Norwich on Monday, and was drowned.

Another victim to the fatal railway fog is reported from Richmond, Que. An employee of the G.T.R. was fearfully mangled Tuesday.

It is stated that the amalgamation of the Grand Trunk and Great Western has resulted in advancing the market value of the combined property not less than \$14,000,000.

Recent investigations show that several graves in the Mount Forest Cemetery have been robbed of their contents.

Documents received at the Department of Marine and Fisheries are said to completely exonerate the keeper of the Lonely Island light-house of the charge of robbing victims of the Asia disaster.

At midnight on Monday fire was discovered in the Provincial Poor Asylum at Halifax, Nova Scotia. The flames spread rapidly, and it would appear the whole building was destroyed.

Reports from the Dominion surveyors at work in the North West state that fully 500 townships will be roughly surveyed this season.

The Grand Trunk authorities are about to close the old Great Western station at Guelph, and have commenced the erection of a temporary station at the junction of the Grand Trunk and Great Western, for use until a new station is erected.

It now transpires that Mr. Senecal borrowed the money wherewith to take up \$1,500,000 of the new Quebec loan at 3 per cent. As the loan carries 5 per cent, interest, Mr. Senecal derives an income of \$50,000 yearly from the transaction, at the expense of the taxpayers.

The Agricultural Society of the Township of Durty offered prizes for the best acre of turps grown by a member of the Society. The following is a list of the successful competitors:—First prize, Fred Hall, 946 bushels per acre; 2nd, Wm. Brien, 920; 3rd, George Donald, 928; 4th, John Barbour, 920.

The disallowance of the Railway Acts passed by the Provincial Legislature of Manitoba by the Dominion Government fell like a bombshell upon the people of the Prairie Provinces.

A passenger train ran into a freight train near Dundalk, Ont., on Monday morning. Both engines and twenty cars were wrecked; the engineer of the passenger train was fatally injured, and the fireman of the freight train running the train met the meeting, point in violation of the rule.

It is stated at the Interior Department, that since the adjournment of Congress 300 miles of the Northern Pacific Railroad have been examined and accepted by the Government. The route is 2,000,000 acres of land which will be sold to the newly built road which will be built to the coast. It is said that there is only about 400 miles of this road to be built.
