He refused to tell where it was concealed, and they beat and kicked him and threatened his life. He still refused to divulge where his treasure was hid. One man, tall and heavy, put the heel of his boot on the miser's big toe and turned about on it, tearing off the nail. Another lighted a newspaper and held the flame against the old man's bare body. Then he told him where \$5,-000 in government bonds were concealed. The bonds with coupens uncut, for twenry years, were valued at \$13,000. The burglars also got \$200 cash. Nothing was known about the affair till Saturday afternoon. Halroyd was found bruised and suffering in a dirty bed, but refused medical aid. He is worth probably \$15,000, and is likely to die from shock and injuries. Halroyd and wife died because of Halroyd's harsh treatment and continual efforts to get possession of his wife's property.
