Newspaper Laws. We call the special attention of Post masters and subscribers to the following synopsis of the newspaper laws:

1. If any person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether it be taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until payment is made.

3. Any person who takes a paper from the post office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not is responsible for the pay.

4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time, and it is published continues to send, the subscriber is bound to pay for it if he takes it out of the post office. This proceeds upon to ground just as one must pay for what he uses.
