We are informed that there was a small insurance on the buildings, but the loss to Mr. Goodwin is heavy.—Chatsworth News.

MR. HENRY NORTON'S dwelling home and a large portion of the contents, on the 9th con. of Holland, were consumed by fire early last Monday morning. It is thought the fire occurred through a defect in the chimney, as there had not been a fire in the stove since the evening. The fire when first discovered was coming through the upstairs ceiling and was first seen by the hired man, who at once proceeded to save what they could of the contents. The loss is partially covered by insurance.—News.

BARNS BURNED.—On Wednesday of last week about 11:30 a.m. fire broke out in the big barn of Robt. Stafford, Berkeley, which was rapidly consumed together with mower, horse rake, harness, forks, &c. Nothing was saved except a buggy and pair of boots. The latter being badly damaged. The neighbors were promptly on hand and had a hard fight to save the barn of Geo. Williams on one side and the buildings of Wm. Sargent across the road. The flying cinders set fire to a pea straw stack of the farmer, and but for the well directed and determined efforts of willing hands the out-buildings of both would soon have been in ashes. The fire was supposed to originate from the children playing with matches. Mr. Stafford had no insurance.—Marketale Standard.
