I send you the following extract Ducks. " from a letter which I recently received Apples per bag ...... 0 75 to 1 00 interesting description of the most common methods of winning from mother earth that much sought-after commodity gold. He writes as follows:-I am in the Cariboo country, Horsefly district, between three and four hundred miles from the coast, about 140 miles from Appetito and Mealth Restored by Ashcroft on the C. P. R. up the Cariboo wagon road and 35 miles in from the wagon road by trail. I am pay-master for Mr. McGillivray who has a contract making about 10 miles of a ditch to bring water on to a hydraulic mining claim. It is quite a large contract. There is in it 13 miles of steel pipe 30in. in diameter which costs about \$2.50 per lined foot in

places. It is all riveted the same as a steam boiler. The ditch outside of the pipe will cost about \$30,000. They have about 200 ft. pressure, and the water at the mine comes through a six in. nozzle and is directed against the gravel bank containing the gold. The water has a tremendous force and undermines the bank. The steam is then turned on the loose gravel which is forced off into a drain or flume constructed with an incline and the gravel boulders and debris are carried off into the river below. The


