DIED at his residence, Sangren, Bruce Co., on the 4th of Sep. Mr. Archibald McGillivray, aged 68 years. Mr. McGillivray from Mill, Argyleshire, to Canada in 1841. He first settled for a few years in Pickering, Ont., and then removed to Bentinck in 1849. Mr. McGillivray was a representative Highlander, and was universally respected by a large circle of friends.

A very disastrous fire occurred early Monday morning at Mr. S. T. Orchard's 2nd con. Egremont, by which he lost his barn with all its contents, including a great number of hogs, seed corn, 5 sets of harness, and many other small articles usually found in stables and barns. He had gone to feed the horses early as he intended going to the market for a load of barrels. He found the stallion, which was kept loose in a box stall, in the feed passage, up to its knees in hay. He got frightened and jumped over Mr. Orchard thereby breaking the lantern and set fire to the oil. Immediately the hay was in flames.

Mr. Orchard, who almost miraculously escaped personal injury managed to save the horses, but a bull got his head before being extinguished. The implements might have been saved but the house demanded all attention, and had not a shower that morning dampened everything, the efforts of the neighbors would have been unavailing. The loss is about \$1200. Insured for \$700. Mr. Orchard has the sympathy of the community in his loss, while at the same time, what might have been, had that horse disabled him, calls for congratulations.
