FIVE DOCTORS FOR MUNICIPAL CANDIDATE? Don't sacrifice principle for the sake of election to a municipal office. Don't make promises which you have no final decision on all questions made prominent for election purposes until you are elected and have consulted with your local councillors.

Don't descend to personalities during the municipal campaign. Preserve your self respect. The electors probably know your opponent.

Don't make politics the basis of your candidature. Ascertain the reforms necessary to conduct the business of a municipality with economy and on business principles. Present the facts to the people plain and brief. The electors may disagree with you, but your time will come.

Don't force a contest for the office of mayor or reeve when you are sure of election to a seat at the council. Results are effects which proceed from the hard efforts and electors sometimes deplore ambition.

We in Ontario point with pride to our efficient system of municipal government, as compared with those of the United States.

It is the habit of appealing to municipal pride is not to be rhodomontade, we must keep politics out of municipal elections and elect representatives who will not let a municipality be merely a business corporation, to be conducted on business principles.

Underneath all remedies that may be suggested for the better government of any municipality, is the inequality of the doctrine that they must be ruled on sound business principles, and that the question of policy that divides the best men in politics have no place in the choice of municipal officers.
