THE GLOBE OFFICE BURNED. The Globe Office, Toronto, was totally destroyed by fire on Sunday morning. The fire originated in the boiler room and was discovered by the night watchman about three o'clock, while making his ordinary rounds. The alarm was given at once, but, before even the fire brigades had reached the building the flames had shot up through the elevator to the third flat, and in an incredibly short time the whole building was wrapped in flames. The fire spread life may be even more pleasant than rapidly to the adjoining buildings with such rapidity and volume, that the tire block covering two acres and in the centre of the business portion of the city was soon a mass of flame . Fortunately the snow was falling heavily, and little wind was blowing in the earlier stages of the conflagration. Had it no been for these circumstances the fire would no doubt have attained the most gigantic proportions. As it was, the loss is very great not only to the 'Globe' but to the other business houses in the neighborhood, all of which were of large and expensive character. But the 'Globe is the great loser. Its books and accounts and mailing sheets have been forunately saved.
