## NEW USES FOR ELECTRICITY.

The Wonderful Electrical Machines Exhibited at Buda-Pest, Hungary.

Electricity not only rings door-bells, lights houses, and cooks food, but it sweeps the floors, washes the dishes, blacks boots and shoes, and so on through the whole catalogue of domestic operations. If no machine has yet been invented to dress and feed a man, it is only because the inventor has not so busy that they have not got round yet to the electric valet and the electric knife and fork.

If anyone thinks there is any exaggeration about this, he ought to have attended the exhibition of machines of this sort that has just closed at Buda-Pest, Hungary. This exhibition, which was organized by the Hungarian Commercial Museum, was a great success, and probably will result in greatly increasing the use of small electric motors for domestic purposes. All sorts of curious electrical machines were exhibited, including wood-working and metal-working machines, clothes-washing machines, sewing machines, vacuums, and looms. These different machines were run by thirty-two alternating current motors. From the contest between these two types of current which has been waged almost since the first introduction of electricity may still be said to be carried on even terms, the advantage being a little in favor of the latter.

One of the most interesting machines exhibited was an electric churn, of which the motor was a very interesting current fixed upon a table. The power was transmitted through a flexible connector of sufficient length from a tap in the wall. These are only a small part of the wonderful things shown at Buda-Pest. Electricity is now taking a permanent foothold of the kind, to be held in Paris, and to be kept supplied continually with new electrical curiosities.

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## ANOTHER NEW RAILROAD.

PROPOSED TRANSCONTINENTAL POSITION TO THE C. P. R.

The Manitoba Government is to be arranged to build a line to the Pacific coast via Duluth.

A despatch from Winnipeg, Man., says—this province has put three years and some months are suffering for want of railway communication, the Manitoba Government has decided that something in that line must be done.

The Canadian Pacific is practicing rigid economy; the Northern Pacific is in the hands of receivers; the Hudson Bay Railway is in a state of incubation; none of these can be induced to make any extension. It is, therefore, proposed to build an independent line from this city, north-westerly to the Dauphin, a distance of 300 or 350 miles, and an act of incorporation of the new company will be passed at the coming session of the Legislature.

It is understood that legislation will also be passed authorizing the construction of a line southerly from Winnipeg to the boundary line, there to connect with road.

These two lines being connected, both opening up water lands, the line will be pushed on northward along the route originally intended for the Pacific Railway, through Great Saskatchewan valley to the base of the Rocky Mountains, there connecting with the Government through Yellow Head Pass to the Pacific coast, thus making another transcontinental line from Duluth to Winnipeg to the coast.

It is understood that Premier Greenway's trip south was for the purpose of business connection with the Chicago and North Western capitalists in this new great scheme.

Without a Cent

Bless the Count Who Threw Away \$30,000.

A man once a millionaire, who came from one of the oldest families of Spain, who is a Count and whose daughter is the Countess of St. Augustine of Madrid, is dying almost in a penniless condition in New York city.

His name is Count Joseph de Susti and not many years ago owned \$30,000,000. The remote cause of his present illness is a wound received in a duel when he was 20 years of age.

Count de Susti's vast fortune not a cent remains. He invented the first two great practical cigarette-manufacturing machines put on the market. While the Count lived in Paris during the second Empire, his house was justly celebrated for its princely hospitality. He is said that his table service was all of solid gold.

When a young man he was a brilliant pianist, and he had a reputation as a painter and a linguist, being the master of four languages.

A sudden, well-placed sword cut across his face. He never recovered. He literally threw away his money. He squandered it on his first wife, and then on his second. He came from Paris with his son, Aymer, in 1882, with a small sum of money, which has been exhausted by his present illness. Count de Susti is 70 years old.

Carpet Weaving.

It was in France that the first serious effort was made to establish the manufacture of carpets in the fashion of the Orient. This was the reign of Louis XIV., and the royal manufactures were designed to furnish all manner of furniture, and the Gobelin and Beauvais factories 250 masons weavers were rich tapestries. During the revolution of 1793, these factories were almost suppressed, but Napoleon I. revived the manufacture and finished his palaces with the most magnificent carpets.

The national workshop of France still continues, and the woven stuffs of Gobelin, Beauvais, and the Savonnerie are accounted among the best in Europe.

The knowledge of carpet weaving was presumably introduced into England from France. During the persecution of the Huguenots the carpet weavers, with their artistic craftsmen, fled for refuge to England, and established themselves in various parts of the country.

These places retained their supremacy for a long time, but with the introduction of the Jacquard loom and various improved processes of manufacture, the industry was successfully developed in Kidderminster, Durham, Kilmarnock, and Glasgow.
