BANK OF ENGLAND NOTES.

A DIPHTEHRIC OUTBREAK.

Anti-Typhoid Tablets to be given to an Alarming spread of the Disease.

Information was received at the Provincial Health Department, Toronto, on Wednesday at a serious outbreak of Diphtheria at a point 60 miles from Ignaceville, Ont.

On Tuesday a patient was taken to the hospital with a severe case of the disease. The patient was a man of 40 years of age, and had been carrying with him a quantity of anti-typhoid tablets.
