2. Any person who takes a paper from the post office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not is responsible for the pay.

3. If a subscriber orders his paper to be topped at a certain time, and the published to pay for it if he takes it our f the post office. This proceeds upon te ground hat a man must pay for what he uses.
