THE FIRE HALL.—Elsewhere appears some correspondence re the proposed fire hall at the market square. I would refer from the correspondence that the proposed location will be a serious obstacle in the way of the town getting into a better class of fire engine. It is not only upper town, but the whole town, as the fire underwriters would not likely want the absurd and annoying position of two classes of fire engines. The great consideration in securing a fire engine and appliances was the cutting down of the exorbitant rates charged for Fire Insurance in most parts of the town, and we think it would have been wisdom on the part of the Council to find out the safest location for the Fire Hall in this relation, before building. Getting the engine to a fire is only a secondary matter as only one fire has occurred in town for nearly twenty years where an engine could have saved more than was done without one.

There being much dissatisfaction at the action of the Town Council in deciding to place the Steam Fire Engine on the market square, we were requested by a number of policy holders in the Upper Town, to lay the matter before the Insurance Companies we represent. Our Town Council have purchased a steam fire engine and advertised for tenders for a fire hall and tanks. The town being divided by a large hill, there is considerable dissatisfaction as to where the council have decided to place the engine, (about the middle of the hill). The ratepayers and policy holders in the upper part of the town are much dissatisfied, as it is almost impossible to get the engine up the hill by hand. A number of your policy holders request me to bring the matter before you at once, as it will be a serious matter in the event of fire. Can you do anything to help them in this matter?

I have to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 17th inst. with regard to the proposed location of a Steam Fire Engine in your town.

This is usually a question for the Inspector for the Underwriters' Association to decide when a town applies for a raising of its classification on account of its having a Steam Fire Engine. I have no doubt however that when that office inspects Durham and notices the engine is placed on the lower level or on a lower than the upper portion of your town he will take immediate exception to the same of not providing any adequate fire protection for the upper portion.

We are very familiar with your town, and have a vivid recollection of the steep ascent separating the upper and lower portions, and I should think that ordinary common sense would dictate the placing of the engine on the top of the hill where it would be equally available for the upper portion by being on a level and for the lower portion through being easily hauled down the hill.

I think you need only point these facts out to your townsmen, and have them put the matter in order as to what is really a very serious matter for the portion of the town to be rated for insurance purposes higher than the lower portion through the engine not being considered available.
