FATAL ACCIDENT.

This town and neighborhood were shocked to learn on Thursday night last, that at a raising at Mr. Bowers, in Normandy, Mr. Quintin Campbell had met with an accident likely to prove fatal. While raising a girth in position at the last bent, at the critical moment, it was allowed to slip and falling a distance of 20 feet, one end struck, and the other fell on Mr. Campbell, striking him on the back of the head and neck, and driving him to the ground with cruel force to be further injured and smashed on some pile poles. He was picked up for dead by willing hands. His strong constitution enabled him to struggle for two days with varying hopes on the part of sorrowing friends, but on Saturday the end came. We give a short account elsewhere.

TEACHERS' CONVENTION.
