nopsis of the newspaperlaws: 1. If any person orders his paper discontipued, he must pay all arreages, or the publisher may continue to send it until paymentis .nade, and collect the whole an coul whether it be taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until paymentismade.

2. Any person who takes a paper from the post office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not is responsible for the pay.

3. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time, and the published continues to send, the subscriberis bound o pay for it if he takes it out of the post flice. This proceeds upon be ground bat a man must pay for what he uses.
