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RIOTS IN INDIA.

A Mob of Mohammedans Attack a Hindu Procession—Police Fire and Kill Two of the Assaulters.

A despatch from Bombay says:—Serious disturbances resulting from the enmity of the Hindus and Mohammedans are reported from Dhubia, a town in the Kanadwa district, about 150 miles from this city.

The trouble began on August 24, when the Mohammedans attacked and routed a Hindu procession. On Sunday the Hindus held another procession, which was headed by a band of music. A mob of Mohammedans obstructed the way, and wistfuling the colors of the police, who escorted the parade. Then some one ordered the police to fire, and the command was obeyed. Ten Mohammedans were killed by the volley and 500 were wounded.
