The Mayorial contest excited by far the greatest interest and the narrow majority shows that the town was fairly divided between the two candidates. We regret Mr. Calder's defeat, and yet congratulate him on the plucky run he made against adverse influences.

The North Ward presents a surprisingly close vote. Mr. A. S. Hunter being only two votes. The candidates in this ward were somewhat rattled in their canvass owing to the double vote.
