

Fifty years hence people will scarcely believe it when told that in the year of grace 1896, some of the richest counties in Ontario housed their poor in the common jails. We hear a great deal about Russian despotism, the Armenian persecutions and Chinese atrocities, but we have yet to Chinese atrocities, but we have yet to learn that either of these nationalities cast their honest poor into prison, to be released only when carried off to the Potter's field. 
