—Ed. Blake, M. P. is home from New Zealand again attending to his duties.

—The Conservatives, of Meaford, and St. Vincent have sent Dr. Spry, M. P. for E. Grey, a copy of a resolution passed by the Liberal Conservative Association endorsing his course at Ottawa, and expressing confidence in him.

—A proposal to grant a pension to the members of the Royal Canadian Dragoon Guards, was introduced in the Imperial Parliament. The good men have now only \$11.00 as a Colonel of the Guards, \$6,000 annually as a prince, a free residence in London and some other pickings to live upon.

—Sir Oliver Mowat has sent the question. The mileage rate is to be paid to the railways. Members are to receive passes good for a year instead of for the session. Sir Oliver is a genius. This is better for the railways for the members, the country gets less money than it ever did, and members can scarcely be said to be flummoxed by passes that have been paid for.

—The Orange constituents of Mr. Joe McGuillivray, North Galt are urging him to oppose all attempts at remedial legislation at Ottawa. Mr. McGuillivray will make his bow and say: "Gentlemen you allowed me a free hand before the election, the Co-operation for me now, and then we will reluctantly vote to sustain Manitoba."

—The Ottawa correspondent of the "Globe" thinks it is time Premier Bowell made some explanations, as statements by Sir Chas. Tupper cannot be relied on. Sir Chas. Tupper, says, practically puts himself out of public life by garbling a telegram he had no business to read, and must not now be allowed to return to the High Commissionership.

—The very recent death of Kate Tonge at Gravenhurst is likely to cause some noise as it appears to be another of those modern murders resulting from misplaced life-insurance.
