All the clubs were represented except Walkerton, who telephoned their desire to join.

THE MANITOBA SCHOOL CONFERENCE.
 Has closed. No compromise has been effected. But, the position of parties is now clearly defined—the claims put forth by the Dominion Government, and the modification of the existing School Law to which the Government of Manitoba could agree.
 The Dominion Government in effect demands the re-establishment of Separate Normal Schools for the training of their teachers. To this the Manitoba Commissioners could not agree, because in the first place it would be a complete reversal of the policy of the Government and destructive of the Public Schools, and second, it would be directly contrary to the wishes of the electors of Manitoba declared at the late general election. The financial objections also to the claims of the Dominion Government are of a serious nature. The rates paid by the Roman Catholic ratepayers might only be a fraction of the cost of the School, yet the rest of the district must maintain it and the result would be that the expenses of the Schools in a great majority of the cities, towns and villages of Manitoba would require to be met out of the taxes paid by non-Catholic ratepayers, and the Separate Schools would therefore be an unnecessary and additional charge upon the School revenues which already are in every case heavily burdened.
 However, to make good the offer of Manitoba to remedy a well founded grievance, and to remove any disabilities under which Roman Catholic children might suffer under the Separate School system, the commissioners from the Manitoba Government submitted the following propositions:—
 First, they offer to completely secularize the Public School system, or second as an alternative to allow religious teaching by any Christian religion approved of by the trustees in the afternoon of every school day from half past three to four o'clock. But neither of these when she offered to secularize the Public Schools, while at the same time she offered every facility to the different religious denominations for the religious instruction of the children belonging to them respectively. In a mixed community and especially where the population is so sparse as it is in Manitoba no other method seems so equitable and workable as that suggested by Mr. Greenway's Government, and in this they will be supported by the good sense and intelligence of the whole Dominion.
