SPRAYING.—On Thursday afternoon last, some twenty or thirty fruit growers met at the Town Hall to elect Mr. H. Pettit, of Grimsby, who was delegated by the Ontario Min. of Agriculture, to attend on the part of the preliminary talks on the benefits of spraying fruit trees and shrubs. The Ontario Min. is in connection with the spraying apparatus in charge of a competent person, that all interested may see a practical illustration of the system. The time of the exhibition will depend on the advancement of the land, as David Jackson's orchard has been selected to show all with a view to point to be on hand. Mr. Pettit has perfect faith in its efficacy, and is loaded with complimentary letters from the fruit and tree owners who have followed spraying. The apparatus costs from \$12 to \$30 and orchardists will have to cooperate. The material costs, on spray application, and there must be five applications in a year (not present). Two more will be as well as every other day on a day, so that the outlay is not prohibitive.
