### LATONA SCHOOL HOUSE.

The Meeting here on Saturday night was a Landerkin meeting called by him, and as it turned out the neighborhood is largely in sympathy with him. Prominent residents said it was the best public meeting they ever had.

Reeve Binnie was in the chair and called first upon Dr. McCullough, of Chatsworth. He was received warmly and showed up many of the weaknesses of the Tupper administration, describing Tupper's followers by comparing them to Jacob's lambs, all ring-straked and speckled.

Mr. Puthorough is out for Mr. Allan, and in defence of the Patron Organization. Farmers he said were not looked upon as a brainy race, but were beginning to see farther than they used to do. He read and dilated upon some of the patron planks.

Mr. Allan talked of the humbling of tariff talk, of the increase of the debt, of the likeness of the two parties to the two lawyers who schemed to rob two opposing clients, of the embargo, and what farmers would have done, of passes and mileage and national schools.

Mr. P. Malone, of Sullivan who is doing noble work for Clark in North Grey, paid some high compliments to Dr. Landerkin, and then with their late member Masson. Dr. Landerkin was the only one of those at the distress meeting last summer who did something for the farmer in the House and out of it. Dr. Jamieson had done something. "He got a reduction of 40 cts a ton and stuck it in his pocket."

He sympathized with the Conservatives and with Jamieson who could not hit a man to represent him.

Referring to the plotting of last session, he said a disease had struck the government and Dr. Tupper was called in; he found there was too much Bowells and as a remedy he removed both Bowells and body.

The Tories cried a few years ago that Mowat must go, and now when he was "going" they were dissatisfied. They kept taking up Mercier's bones, but seemed to forget Mercier was turned out, while hoodlums in the Tory ranks were honored.

He was loudly cheered.

A. B. McCallum made another of his slashing speeches, and showed how the return of Mr. Allan would not frighten Tupper, as his (Allan's) cry of humbug about tariff, showed his respect for conservative principles. Their first impulse should be to turn out the present government in stead of folding their hands and let the Liberal party do it.

He scathingly denounced Mr. Allan for re-repeating the half truth about the increase of debt in McKenzie's time without mentioning the fact that he was fulfilling obligations left by his predecessors.

Referring to a cartoon in the Mail a few days ago representing McKenzie, guarding the national strong box, he pointed out that McKenzie did guard it, while Tupper makes rats upon it himself for party purposes.

He covered the whole field, in a masterly speech the best of the three he had so far delivered in this riding.

Much regret was expressed at Dr. Landerkin's inability to be present.

Cheers were given for Britain's Queen and South Grey's champion, Landerkin, and the meeting dispersed with Sunday not far distant.

### HOPEVILLE.

The O'Bryne v Fetters Law Suit ended on Tuesday the 2nd by allowing Fetters to keep the farm. A larger number of witnesses went from here than we mentioned last week. There is talk that it will be appealed.

The public meeting for Patron Candidate on Tuesday the 2nd inst. was not largely attended. At the opening several parties were proposed for chairman, all objected. Mr. S. Rogers Ex Reeve objected that he was one of the chosen speakers and wanted to introduce Mr. Bowles the Patron Candidate, finally he was pressed to be chairman and first speaker, so he spread himself for half an hour. Then Mr. Bowles spoke after him. Dr. Gledding, of Conn. took the floor this finished up the speaking. There was no representative Dr. Sproule.

Four Delegates went from here on Friday the 5th inst. to attend a Reform Convention. There they decided not to bring out any candidate. Other particulars I did not hear.

A. H. B. has had a busy week attending business meeting, etc., at Owen Sound Court, at Patron public meeting, at Mount Forest, at Reform Convention, etc.

John McEachern has moved back to his house here from Mt. Forest and he has started to his work again in Yeovil.

Two of our neighbors had a drive to Walters' Falls last week on business regarding the Chosen Friends' Lodge. We hear there is some difficulty in the matter and opinions differ as to the cause. By what we understand, a man dies there who used to live here and belonged to the lodge.

I had a drive through part of Ardenia a few days ago and in talking to the people about the election, I find a strong feeling for Dr. Landerkin. Some people who you would think are for Dr. Jamieson and were formerly, are now likely to go for Dr. Landerkin. There is quite a feeling against Dr. Jamieson regarding the Priceville P. O., they think he will be a party to have the P. O. taken from the present occupant Miss Brown who has so very faithfully fulfilled the duties as Postmistress for years. ### EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met May 29th. Minutes of previous meeting confirmed.

Bye-Leith—That in reply to the clerk of the Peace relation to the appointment of County Constables, that the following persons be recommended, John Queen, Wm. Seaman, Wal. Ferguson, R. Brown, John Renton, Wm. Rawa, Wm. Fitzell and Wm. Patterson. Carried.

Hunter—Bye—That the acct of Dr. Bird for Medical attendance on Wm. Williams be not entertained.—Carried.

Allan—Hunter—That the reeve be authorized to repair the bridge on BaseLine, known as Coutts and make it secure for the travelling public.—Carried.

Dep-Allan reported that he met the reeve Normanby and put in a tile culvert at Varney and covered a bridge with timber. The reeve of Normanby hired men and teams they considering this the better way; Cost of timber, \$1.25; Grate and Spikes, 80c; Tiles, \$4; Labor, \$11.40. Total \$17.82. Egt's share \$8.91, and recommend payment of the same.

Hunter—Bye—That foregoing report be adopted and he receive \$1.50 for his service.—Carried.

Allan—Hunter—That we now form a Court of Revision with the reeve in the Chair.—Carried.

The members of Court subscribed to the required Declaration when the following appeals were investigated, Mal. McPhee Lot 28, Con. 8 reduced \$100; Philip Gardiner Lot 1-2, Con. 4 reduced \$20; Walter Hastie's appeal not sustained.

The following names were added to the Roll: Dr. Sneath Lot 16, Con. 18, George Gushie, Lot 12, Con. 19, D. McVicar part 13 Con 18. These being all the additions, it was moved by J. Allan, seconded by R. Bye, that the Court of Revision now close, and the Roll as revised, be finally passed. Council resumed.—Carried.

Allan—Leith—That the Reeve and 1st Dep. be a committee to examine the acct of W. A. Fraser's, and report at next Council regarding length of span, and kind of bridge required.—Carried.

Leith—Bye—That P. Mutch receive the sum of \$2.50 to assist digging drain on lot 9, con. 13.—Carried.

Leith—Hunter—That we authorize the reeve to meet the reeve of Normanby to see about Smith's bridge on the gravel road.—Carried.

D. Leith reported that he found it necessary to have a culvert put in between upper and lower town, Dromore, at a cost of \$4.25, work done as specified and recommended payment.

Allan—Hunter—That foregoing report be adopted and he receive 50c for his services.—Carried.

Bye—Leith—That the acct of Dr. Brown and \$22 for medical attention on Wm. Williams and Mrs. Heid be paid.—Carried.

Bye—Allan—That the following persons be exempt from Statute Law, Mrs. Micks, J. Cross, Miss Beattie, Miss Spencer and Mrs. Amos.—Carried.

Bye—Hunter—That the reeve and Dr. Brown consult Wm. Williams concerning the amputation of his foot, as the Dr. pronounces it incurable, and if agreeable to him to have it removed.—Carried.

Allan—Leith—That the Assessor be paid \$90 on Salary acct.—Carried.

Dep. Bye reported that he let the job of covering Bowman's bridge for \$13.25 covering being 1500 feet of rock elm, completed, payment recommended.

Hunter—Allan—That for going report be adopted and he receive 75c for his services.—Carried.

Dep-Bye also reported that he secured the service of Hugh Yake to assist in removing drift timber from Arthur's bridge and recommended him to be paid the sum of \$2.50.

Allan—Hunter—That the report Dep. Bye re Arthur's bridge be adopted and order granted, and as Mr. Bye certifies he spent the same time at the removal of drift-wood, that he also be paid the sum of \$2.50.—Carried.

Resolved that T. Tribes bill of Board for Wm. Williams up to May 30th, 1896 weeks amt'g. to \$24 be paid.—Carried.
