GLENELG COUNCIL.

SPECIAL MEETING.

Gleneleg Council met in special Session on June 12th to consider an application of the Huron and Ontario Railway Company for a right of way on the high-ways, through said Township. All the members present. The Receiver in the chair. An agreement in blank, was submitted to Council, and the several clauses thereof considered and fully discussed. When it was moved by Mr. McFadden, seconded by Mr. Staples, that the application from the Huron and Ontario Railway for a right of way along the highway of the township of Gleneleg, between the Village of Priceville and the town of Durham be granted to the said railway Company, on the road known as the Durham road, and that a Bye-Law be passed confirming an agreement between the said company and this municipality. Carried.

A Bye-Law was introduced, read a first and second time, and numbered 356 in accordance with above resolution.

Moved by Mr. Arrowsmith seconded by Mr. Lamb that By-Law No. 356 be now read a third time. Signed, sealed and engrossed on Bye-Law Book. Carried.

By-Law No. 356 was read according to the Council adjourned.

THE ELECTRIC RAILWAY.

A meeting of the Huron & Ontario Railway Co. was held at 2 p. m. on Friday, June 12th at the Rossin House, Toronto, and after adjournment at 6 p. m., deliberations were again resumed at an evening session and renewed during Saturday forenoon.

An agreement for contract for construction was drawn up, as neatly as considered advisable, upon the lines indicated in a letter from Miller Bros., setting forth in a general way the terms and conditions upon which the latter would be willing to execute a contract.

After careful scrutiny and prolonged discussion the agreement was adopted and the secretary instructed to forward it to the financiers at once for their consideration.

If the agreement is acceptable to the above named bankers one of the firm will come up and execute the contract at the next meeting of the company. Should it not meet with their approval, however, it will be so amended by them as to meet their view and again returned to the Provincial Co. as now organized for further consideration by the latter.

The different members of the Company were requested to state what progress had been made in the way of securing the right of way to the highways in the different municipalities to which the by-laws and agreements had been presented, and with one exception the report was that the Councils approached had passed resolutions in favor of adopting them as they now read.

Construction may begin in any one municipality as soon as the franchise for it is secured, but it is desirable that the council of several townships, towns and villages on the western section of the proposed route. The agreements and by-laws must be read by each Council three times and notices of the third reading must be posted up in conspicuous places in each municipality.—*Shef.*

The line was located from Shelburne through Osprey and Eugenia to Flesherton, upon certain conditions which the representatives from the places named expressed their readiness to assent to.
