A SERMON by the late Rev. JAMES CAMERON.

We have been furnished by the Rev. Chas. Cameron, with the following abstract of a sermon by the above well known divine. We believe it will be interesting to our readers who knew the deceased, and others.

"And they that are Christ's have crucified the flesh with the affections and lusts"; Gal. 5. 24.

Last Sabbath it was our privilege to sit at the table of the Lord. What is our duty to-day? Are we to say let us lie down and sleep, or let us rise up and work? The former speech let us sleep, &c., is the speech of the hypocrite and of the formalist: the true Christian says, let me rise up and work, his aim and desire is to forget those things that are behind and to press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus. To day I will attempt I. To explain the text, and II. To apply it.

In the way of explanation, observe the name given here to believers, "they that are Christ's." This is a beautiful, honorable and comforting name. They are so called because God gave them to Christ and because Christ gave Himself for them in obeying, suffering and dying for their sins, because He called them, and united them to Himself. He rose for their justification and entered heaven to prepare a place for them and by baptism and sitting at his table they are under vows of obedience to him. It is proper then to call them "they that are Christ's."

I. The word flesh in the text sometimes means human nature. "And the word became flesh," Joh. 1: 14. It means the body distinct from the soul. "A spirit has not flesh and blood as ye see me have," Luke 24. 29. But here it means, corrupt nature, the evil heart being the root of all evil thoughts and actions.

3. In the way of explanation, "the affections and lusts" are the fruit of the flesh, the root. To prove this we have only to look at the preceding verses, where we find no less than seventeen kinds of this fruit specified, namely, adultery, fornication, uncleanness, &c., sins in heathen lands stand first; and wrath, strife, sedition, heresies, &c., sins of civilized countries being in the rear of this horrible list of the affections and lusts of the flesh. Again notice the meaning of the word crucify. Crucifixion was a horrible death, the hands and feet were nailed to the cross. The vital parts were untouched. It was a slow painful, shameful and sure death. Such is the way the Christian has to deal with the flesh, and with its affections and lusts.

II. Let us now proceed to apply the text, and to apply it to ourselves as recently commemorating the Lord's death.

The proper way to perform this duty of crucifying the flesh successfully is first to become a Christian. When a man wants to become a good tradesman he places himself under a skilful master. If one is laboring under some disease that is hurrying him fast to the grave, will he not put himself at once under a skilful physician? So if a man is to crucify the flesh, his first step is to place himself under Christ. The way of Jesus was always to get people to put themselves under Him. Come unto me: Look unto me, follow me, believe me, and I will have mercy on you. It is under him, through him,

by him, and with him the work is to be carried on. Beware then of the common mistake, I will crucify the flesh first and then I will come to Christ. I will come when I reform and become a better man, this is Satan's teaching to which we are not to listen. We are to come to Christ as we are, and with all our wants. He will surely help us. Just as I am, and waiting not, to rid my soul of one dark blot. To thee, whose blood can cleanse each spot, O Lamb of God, I come." Christ is the beginning, the middle and the end of all true religion. From the text we see the distinction between justification and sanctification, they that are Christ's are pardoned and justified which is an act of God's free grace. In it the old man is nailed to the tree but is not dead; hence the need of being sanctified. In one the sinner's condition is changed, in the other his character is. To rest upon justification without sanctification is antinomianism, and to rest on sanctification without justification is mere legalism, but to unite both together constitutes a true Christian.

Sanctification is a slow and painful process. It is as Christ said like plucking out the right eye, and the cutting off the right hand that offended and casting them from thee, Mat. 5. 29, 30. This is not to be done in the literal sense. As some men understood it, who inflicted severe wounds on their own bodies in the way of obtaining sanctification. But we have better illustrations of what the crucifying of the flesh means in the case of Noah carrying on the building of the ark when all his neighbors were eating and drinking and making merry at his expense. Also in the case of Abraham when he left his country and his father's house and kindred to go to a land of which he knew nothing. Was it not a crucifixion of the flesh when Moses chose rather to suffer affliction with the people of God than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season. Also David and his three companions chose pulse and water rather than the wine and dainties that came from the King's table, then Saul cast in his lot with the despised sect and became a preacher of Christ—he was persecuted. We can get illustrations of this point in our own daily life. Is it not a crucifying of the flesh when a man or a woman whose clothes are getting shabby will rather bear the remarks of their neighbors than forsake the house of God? When a man who is of a worldly, saving, narrow, stingy disposition takes a \$5 bill and give it to the cause of Christ when his neighbors are it may be giving only ten cents? Surely that man has begun to crucify the flesh. Likewise is the man who ceases work earlier on Saturday evening, saying that he may be fresh for the duties of the Sabbath. It is Sabbath morning when the flesh cries for a little more slumber, he is up in time and ready to go on foot or in his conveyance to the house of God, balance good hard-wood lurch.
