BICYCLE CRAZE IN EUROPE. Recent facts and figures from all parts of Europe prove that the bicycle craze has now become universal. The increase in France, where exact returns are collected, is typical. Three years ago, when the tax on cycles was first levied, the number in the country was 120,000. Last year the total had ex-

actly doubled. When the estimates for 1896 were drawn up the financial offi-cials deemed justified the calculation that there would be 40,000 additional bicycles. It turns out that their sanguine hope is considerably short of the mark. The total this year is 322,000, or 202,000 more than the number in 1893.



DOESN'T PAY FOR CORONATION. The impression that the expenditure in connection with the coronation at Moscow was paid by the Czar out of his own pocket was erroneous. Every rouble in the Imperial Treasury is supposed to be at the absolute disposal of the Czar and he draws upon the Trea-sury at discretion. In addition, he is the owner of large estates in different parts of Russia, and is well able to pay all the bills incurred during the coronation ceremonies-if he felt so inclined.

EUROPE'S ELECTRIC RAILWAYS. Electric lines in Europe increased in number from 70 to 111 during 1895, their length from 700 to 902 kilometres (560 miles), and the power from 18,150 to 25,095 kilowatts. Germany leads with 406 kilometres, followed by France with 132 and England with 107, and Switzerland fourth with 47. The only countries still free from electric traction are Bulgaria, Greece and Denmark.
