THE ELECTRIC RAILWAY.—In our last issue it was stated that Mr. McNamara had gone to New York to have a conference with Miller Bros. in regard to the Huron and Ontario Electric Railway. He has since returned and regards his mission as being successful. Miller Bros. are not a myth as some have supposed, but are a firm of very shrewd and wide-awake brokers. The irrepressible Pew was there, and was as cool and hopeful as ever. Another gentleman who took part in the conference was an engineer named Moore. It seems that Moore is the most important man in the whole business, for he is the man that controls the money. Thus far we have been dealing with men who have no money. Pew has no money, Miller has no money, at least no money to build railways with, and contractor Moore is just in the same fix. But Moore is able to get a good deal closer to the money than any of the others. The money belongs to the heirs of a certain large estate, which the executor are seeking profitable investment for, and on Moore's recommendation it will be so invested. Before recommendation that this money be applied for the purpose of building an electric railway, there are a few things which Mr. Moore would like to know. First of all he must have a free right of way, from one end of the road to the other. Then he wants to have the route surveyed by a competent engineer, a map made showing the height of the grades, and the water privileges. Next he wants a statement of the probable earnings of the road after it has been constructed. When this information has been supplied him, if it is satisfactory, he will then go on and build the road. In fact he is ready to begin now, and is anxious to complete the portion from Walkerton to Goderich this fall. Mr. McNamara came away well pleased. He is of opinion that while this man Moore is not the kind of a man to rush into wild cat schemes, yet he means business, and he is anxious to go on with the work, provided he can see a reasonable prospect of making undervaluing pay. The right of way has already been secured for a distance of 150 miles, nearly all the townships along the way, showing a disposition to help the project along.—*Telescope.*

Durham School has done well, and Mr. Mills is to be congratulated on the success attained by the pupils. 17 out of 24 is a good proportion, besides he has one passed in Markdale, and Bert Mockler, who wrote in Rat Portage is expected to add one more to the number.
Mr. John Graham, as usual has a record, 3 for Entrance all passed, 6 for Leaving 4 passed, 1 Recommended and 1 secured Entrance standing. Two of his entrance are near the top in the County. The Section appreciates ability and never allows Mr. Graham anxiety as to the future and have re-engaged him for 1897.
Mr. Brown, Hanover, has also a high proportion passed, two of his pupils being the highest in the county.
Mr. Dixon, of No. 1, Gleneden, passed 4 out of 5 and Mr. Cashin, of No. 13 Egremont had two writing and both passed.
The following is the complete list of the Entrance and Leaving candidates who passed these examinations or were recommended by the Board of Examiners for the centres named. The marks required to pass were: Entrance 42, Leaving 637, besides one-third of the marks in each subject for both examinations. One third of the marks in each subject was required before a candidate was awarded an Entrance certificate on the Leaving Examination. The Education Department will confirm or disallow the admission of recommended candidates. Certificates will be sent to teachers in due time.
