COLD STORAGE.
 The government was interviewed a few days ago by representatives of the Patrons of Industry, the Cheese and Butter Industries, Dairyman's Associations, etc.
 Great importance attaches to the meeting as Mr. Laurier gave distinct pledges that at once steps would be taken to facilitate the movement of farmers' produce under conditions of cold storage, etc. likely to be of great benefit. His concluding remarks were: "Cold storage we must have on the ocean. Whether we can have it with the present line is the problem. If we can, we may have to take it. If it cannot be had with the present system, we must look to something else. As to this, it is a matter which will leave to my colleagues and myself, and especially since I have had the good fortune of finding for the Minister of Agriculture a practical farmer in the person of my old friend, Mr. Fisher. In so far as these matters of agriculture are concerned, I am glad to say to Mr. Derbyshire and the other farmers here, Mr. Fisher is my boss; he rules me in those matters. He is a practical farmer, and has suffered with you, and whatsoever his decision, I am ready to abide by it in all matters of that kind."

The Minister of Agriculture also spoke at some length, and we cannot do better than give his remarks in full: "Mr. Chairman and gentlemen, I do not know that I can add anything at all to the remarks of my leader in regard to this matter except to say that I, from a larger experience perhaps than any other member of the government, and I sympathize fully with your demands, and I am glad to say that as a result of several conversations as well as of the representations laid before Mr. Laurier you have the promise he has just given you that on the earliest possible occasion we will provide cold storage for farm products."

I need not say that my experience in agricultural work for twenty years is not only at his disposal but at the disposal of farmers in trying to carry out their desires and wishes. (Cheers.) I fully endorse from the little practical knowledge I have of butter making the statement that in Canada to-day we can produce as fine a quality of butter as well as the best cheese made in the world. This being so it is evident that the low price got for our butter in England is due not to faults of manufacture but to the method of bringing it to England. (Hear, hear.) Therefore it seems to me our duty as a government to try to overcome those difficulties.

It may not be within the knowledge of many of those present that the government has, through Pro. Robertson, the Dominion Dairy Commissioner, made arrangements for cold storage in certain vessels. The Elder-Dempster Line are to despatch two vessels with mechanical cold storage this season, and will also provide a limited amount of insulated compartments to carry butter to Avonmouth. This morning I had an interview with the agents of that line, and arranged with them to provide additional space, because I found the space arranged for in the original agreement was not enough to meet the demands of the trade. I think this will show you that I appreciate the needs of this work, and am ready at the earliest moment to meet the difficulties.

The difficulties of providing mechanical cold storage are greater, because it is impossible at short notice to provide that; but I trust that in the near future such arrangements will be made to meet the wants of the trade as will prove satisfactory.
 I was glad to hear the few words from Mr. Dunlop regarding the shipment of fruit, because in this matter there is room for great improvement. This present season we are likely to have a large crop of summer and fall apples, and I also understand that the English crop is bad, and perhaps there will be a good demand for the finest quality of Canadian fruit in the English markets this fall. I trust that as soon as the demand comes we will have reached arrangements by which we can send forward at least a trial shipment in cold storage, so that our people can reap the benefits, though this fall it can only be more or less of a trial owing to the impossibility of fully meeting the demands of the trade."

Mr. Ritchie Cartwright also spoke and showed an intimate knowledge of the subject. The following hopeful words will commend themselves to the farming community: "It is time, if this country is to be what it ought to be, that the farming community should be aided and encouraged, and anything we can do to make farming more profitable will command our earnest and most unceasing attention."

Messrs J. Lockie Wilson, Rogers, G. S. McDonald and Walter Smith represented the Patrons; Derbyshire, Wade McPherson and others the Dairying interests.
