EDITORIAL NOTE AND COMMENT.

Premier Laurier has consented to open the Toronto Exhibition. Manager Hill is trying to get the great Li Hung to attend, and Lord Chief Justice Russell, of England now in the States, is going to visit Toronto and the civic authorities are trying for his presence also.

—Mr. Edgar was elected speaker of the new Parliament without opposition. Sir Chas. made the French Liberals laugh as he entered a mild protest against the selection of an English speaking speaker twice in succession. Mr. Edgar drew applause from both sides by repeating his speech in French.

—The much talked of caucus of Conservative members at the opening of the Session was very slimly attended, so the question of leadership and opposition policy are left in abeyance. Hugh John McDonald was present, R. F. McLennan was Chairman, and the motion to adjourn was moved by Sir Charles Tupper.

—The death of Provincial Secretary Balfour in the Parliament Buildings is remarkable as being the second that has occurred of a minister dying in the midst of his duties. The other case was Mr. C. F. Fraser. Both men were great opponents of legislation that would injure private interests, and as the "Guelph Mercury" says, "Mr. Balfour's combination of radicalism and wisdom is a type we can ill afford to lose from the councils of the Province."

—Look on this picture and then on that. When the Liberals went out of power in 1878, did they adhere to the policy, which, they admitted defeated them? They did. All through their 18 years in the cold wilderness, they held to their policy, and are now rewarded by the nation with an opportunity to put it into force. When the Conservatives went out of power in 1896, did they adhere to the policy their leader was going to die for? Not a bit of it. It is already thrown overboard, and in North Grey they are trying to throw the odium of it on to their opponents.

—The Toronto "Star" (Conservative) says on the opening of the house: "The remains of the arrogant party who had occupied the Government benches was seated at the left of the Speaker, and the strongest and most distinguished looking government since Confederation occupied the benches to the right." Again "Sir Charles Tipper, Bart." was very meek in attitude and conciliatory in tone, and, indeed, he and his following have evidently laid down and are using all their energies in trying to look pleasant. It is a difficult task, and sulphur in the feelings of some of the "remnant weak and small," who have succeeded in getting back to Parliament.

—As expected the speech from the throne given last Thursday is a brief one. It sets forth (1) that parliament has been called by the necessity of making provisions for public service; (2) The public accounts and reports usually submitted could not be presented this session and under that they would meet early in 1897; their attention would be devoted to the subject of supplies. 3. The operation of the tariff is to be made the subject of careful enquiry, so that justice may be done to all classes. 4. Immediate steps are to be taken to settle the Manitoba School difficulty, and confidence is expressed that it will be before next session of Parliament. The hope is expressed that when supplies are granted "I may be able to relieve you from the duty of further attendance at this session of Parliament." To all of which the opposition will have something to say, if they can agree upon it.

SIGNIFICANT—The following paragraph appears in the Toronto Telegram, which is owned by Mr. John Ross Robertson, M. P. for East Toronto:

"It will not take longer than the date of the first Conservative caucus for the ex-Premier to find that even if he be permitted to hold the post of leader of the Opposition his tenure of the place will surely be temporary. The party's best friends acknowledge that a new leader is needed. They know that if an effective fight is to be made the Conservatives must take counsel together. Sir Chas. aspires to a dictatorship. If he be successful in attaining his desire the Tories are doomed to ineffectiveness and futility. Young men are needed to fight the young men who are to sit in the seats of the Ministers. Sir Charles believes he can lead the Opposition; a majority of his fellow-Oppositionists differ from him. They will be doing their duty to the Conservative party by letting him know as soon as may be that he now governs neither the country nor the party."

THE COUNTY COUNCIL DIVISION.

Judges Bell of Kent, and Horne, of Essex have completed their task and reported to the Lieutenant Governor in Council as to the division of the Co. of Grey.

It will be seen that our plan has been followed pretty closely except in the south west corner. As we outlined, 8 divisions have been made, and the only differences are that Normanby and Egremont, and Bentinck and Glenelg are paired instead of Normanby and Bentinck, Glenelg and Egremont also Markdale is thrown in with No. 5, we had it with No. 8.

The divisions will be distinguished by numbers, and are as follows:

1. Owen Sound, Sarawak.
2. Keppel, Derby, Sullivan.
3. Bentinck, Glenelg, Durham.
4. Normanby, Egremont.
5. Proton, Artemesia, Dundalk, Markdale.
6. Osprey, Collingwood, Thornbury.
7. Euphrasia, St. Vincent, Meaford.
8. Holland, Sydenham.

The procedure now is as follows:

The Warden on or before Nov. 15 appoints a Nominating Officer in each division, and he will fix the place of Nomination. This is to be held two weeks before municipal polling day between the hours of one and two o'clock. The language appointing this day is a beautiful example of legal verbosity. "Such nomination day shall be that Monday in the week which precedes the week before polling day."

A voter may give his votes to one candidate where two are to be elected, and these double plumpers we believe will keep up sectionalism, however as two members are to be elected no harm will result except where one municipality puts many candidates up. The election for County Councillors shall be held in alternate years and at the same time as the annual municipal elections.

FREE TRADE WITH THE STATES.

The Premier has lately been making a notable utterance to the correspondent of the "Chicago Record." The statement is evidently intended for the American people and government, and for frankness in presentation, and breadth of view, has seldom been equalled in international talk. There are some who affect to deny the term Statesman to the Premier, admitting his eloquence, affability, etc., but the courage he showed in the last parliament, the firmness he has displayed in following out the course he mapped out, his successful dealing with Manitoba School Question, and now his outline of what may be accomplished for thousands and thousands of farmers on both sides of the line, by international amity in the construction of Public Works and by a judicious arrangement for the free exchange between the two countries of such articles as may be mutually agreed upon, all stamp him a statesman of no mean order. His proposals come with the greater force since his most pronounced opponent never doubts the sincerity which Sir John A. Macdonald admired.

Briefly then, his statements are that the Liberal government intend to signalize its administration by a renewal of friendly relations with the United States; by settling the North Atlantic fishery troubles in a way becoming enlightened people by the simple process of give and take; by co-operation in making and maintaining deep water ways from the West to the Atlantic seaboard, Canadian's sovereignty he frankly says not to be compromised; by bringing these questions, the trade question, the question of bonding privileges, of the Alien labor law, and others all to "one anvil," and there hammered into a harmony as pleasing as it would be profitable.

With such a desire all right thinking people should agree, and the country is fortunate in having a premier and a government anxious to promote the good of the whole people, while jealously conserving national interests and stimulating national aspirations.

—The Orangeville "Sun" says Hon. Clarke Wallace will fall into the ranks behind Sir Charles Tupper as leader "for a dead certainty."
