BURGLARY.

Mayor Laidlaw the Victim.

A Clever Capture.

On Saturday night between 11 p. m. and Sunday, Mr. Laidlaw's store was entered burglariously, the thieves having found their way to the cellar and forced a door up into the store.

The burglar was not discovered till after Sunday, when one of the family going to the store found a coat, pants, shirt, old hat, and two pairs of old boots lying on the floor. These the burglar had replaced by new ones from the stock around them, and had appropriated some gloves. Certain incidents point to the belief that the burglars were familiar with the place. 15 watch chains, a watch, some brooches and other trinkets were removed.

Chief Carson secured the tickets which they had removed from the new garments, and by these the kind of goods is known. This clue is being worked upon and by the aid of the wires it is hoped the rascals will be captured though they chose a good time to prevent a search being made.

-LATER-

The thieves have been caught. Mr. Laidlaw used the wires Sunday where places could be caught, and early on Monday word came from Neustadt that they had been seen. Mr. Laidlaw drove off Neustadt and was on their tracks to Harriston. Not finding them, he returned to Neustadt and wired to Harriston; and a constable there succeeded in arresting them. Meanwhile Chief Carson and Constable Whelan had been doing some work in their work and before long had them in possession. They brought them captives to Durham, and lodged them for an hour or so in the lock up. They were then brought before the court, and the prisoners consisting of Messrs Jas. Edge, W. H. Mocker, and W. Calder. The prisoners pleaded not guilty and elected to be silent till tried by a jury. The constable gave the story of the capture, the watch which belonged to Mr. T. Barclay was found on them and identified by that gentleman, 4 watchchains were found upon them, and Mr. Laidlaw easily identified his clothes.

They had been given a meal by Mr. Geo. Wilson of the Sawmill, North Egremont, and he identified them. So it seems to be a clear case. They were sent to Owen Sound to await their trial at the forthcoming assizes.
