### EDITORIAL NOTE AND COMMENT.

—The "Globe" informs its readers that the country will not have long to wait for convincing evidence that the school question will be settled soon. "There will be no coercion under Laurier."

—Tynan, of Phoenix Park fame, is likely to escape. France is not willing to assist in his extradition and may see him off to America. The disclosures have led the British authorities to double the guards at the chief public buildings, and the powder magazine at Woolwich is also vigilantly guarded. In Dublin the view prevails that Tynan is a British spy, while some French papers think the whole scare is got up by Britain to prevent the Czar from going to France.

—The Armenians will have to wait—or die. If the Sultan is crazy there is method in his madness for he effectually plays off one country against another. Britain is again checkmated in her desire to suppress the assassin. When a Russian engineer is invited by the Turks to examine the fortresses on the Dardanelles it is a plain hint to Britain that Russia will resent a single handed interference though prompted by humane considerations. Britain looks towards the States for help, but at present neither party there dare show sympathy for Great Britain and a Presidential election pending. A section of one party denouncing British gold, the other denouncing British commerce. The whole European press except in Italy, have broken out against England because she moved to stop murder. The Armenians will have to wait.

Queen Victoria passed her Jubilee as Sovereign, nearly 10 years ago, her three score and ten as a member of humanity, 7 years ago, and on Wednesday of this week she has passed an other record, viz: the longest reign in British history. Geo. III, her royal, stubborn grandfather, reigned (nominally at least) for 59 years and 97 days and he died. Since the fargone day of the 18th of June 1837 to the 23rd of September 1896 is 59 yrs. and 97 days, so that now a new record is established, not likely ever to be repeated in the roll of British sovereigns, for the signs of the times all point in the direction that the next generation will not sing God save the King with the same fervor that they have used for the Royal Lady who has become endeared to the nation who rejoiced in her pure wedded life, who sorrowed with her in her widowhood, and who are looking with pleasure on her lengthened reign, uninterrupted as was that of Geo. III by regencies.

Some of our Conservative contemporaries are quoting a remark said to have been made by Dr. Laiderkim in caucus, that "a short session would be damned bad for the member's pockets." We venture to say that this story is false and of a piece with other stories we have heard circulated about the doctor. It is a fact that the mass of the Liberals were in favor of a two week session, to pass the estimates merely, and certainly they had a right to expect the help of the opposition for the estimates were virtually the same which

they had brought down. What do we find?—The pages of Hansard loaded with questions if members of the government had said so and so in speeches delivered years ago, the quotations being read and time taker up that led nowhere except to the \$1000 mile stone.

Who made the law anyway that payment of members should be \$10 a day up to 30 days and over that period \$1000? Is it such a cast-iron, brick-sheathed law that it cannot be altered? Does anybody think of altering it? How old is it? Surely a modification can be secured that will remove the anomaly from the statute book and the temptation from Member's paths. A few short speeches, unnecessarily given or spun out may mean, indeed has meant, \$150,000 to the commoners alone, and when the extra expense in the running of the house is considered, thousands more may be added to it. The application of the clause about 2 weeks ago would have been a paying process.

### HURON AND ONTARIO ELECTRIC RAILWAY.

Mr. M. McNamara, President of the Prov. Board of Directors of the above Railway has a three column letter in Bruce Herald last week; showing the possibilities of the road, its prospects of financial success, etc. Mr. McNamara has evidently given the matter close and careful attention, and his summing up should encourage the promoters to go on with this much needed road.

After giving the townships, towns, etc., crossed by the main line which is 191 miles long, and the branches which are 33 miles long, he shows the total tax valuation of real estate per head to be \$415.00 which he assumes is equal to \$630 per head of real value, a good indication of the prosperity of the district. He lays due importance to the fact that the line is not paralleled by any other line.

He says: "All existing lines of railway in the territory through which it passes run north and south, centering for the most part in the city of Toronto. This causes great inconvenience to the public and the proposed Electric line requiring them in most cases to travel long distances to junction points in order to make short jurneys from east to west, or vice versa, frequently requiring over one hundred miles of railway travel to go twenty miles from point to point. It is mainly this fact that gave rise to the necessity of the line across the country, and which together with the resources of the district traversed, promises a profitable traffic for the projected Huron and Ontario Railway. The line averages from 30 to 60 miles north of Toronto."

He divides the line into 4 divisions: 1. Port Perry to Beeton, 53 miles. 2. Beeton to Flesherton 63 miles. 3. Flesherton to Walkerton 37 miles. 4. Walkerton to Kincardine 25 miles. 5. Flesherton to Meaford 25 miles. 6. Walkerton to Goderich 55 miles.

He reckons that a population of 140,000 would be feeders of the road, our own district No. 3, being placed at 25,000.

He sums up the business interests at most of the places, giving Port Perry 55 establishments and 238 hands, Bradford 25 and 73, Uxbridge 49 and 233, Beeton 30 and 102, Shelburne 38 and 103, Durham 50 and 140, Walkerton 99 and 197, Kincardine 50 and 300, Tiverton 28 and 72, Wingham 43 and 413, Lucknow 49 and 176, Goderich 65 and 333, Teeswater 46 and 148. Hanover is not given in number of hands but has 2 cabinet and furniture factories, sash and door factory, tanneries, foundry, grist mill and saw mill.

He reckons that div. No. 3 would require 3 trains a day, No. 6 four trains, all the others 2 trains to begin with.

He gets at the total possible earnings of the road in this way: "The total earnings of all the steam railways in Canada during the last year was \$46,785,487,00 being an average per head of the population of \$9.68 of which \$2.90 per head was for passengers, 25 cents per head for mails, 30c per head for express, and \$6.22 per head for general freight. These figures afford a better idea of comparison, as the roads run through all parts of the country, more than half their mileage being through districts where the population is very thin. The H and O R always merit reasonably expect to equal their earnings for passengers, mail & express. They could not of course enter the list with them for freight.

Assuming this basis we have as probable earnings for 210,000 people:—  
From passengers \$406,000  
From mails 36,400  
From express 42,000  
From freight (say) 120,000  
From rent of power for Electric Light, etc. (say) 30,000  
\$634,400
