

he end of the fifth week. Sixth: That some foods seem to produce milk from which a greater percentage of the fat can be recovered by churning than others.

Seventh: That the greatest difference in the effects of the foods was seen in the quality of the butter. In fact, most foods seem to have some effect in the flavor, melting point, or keeping qualities of the butter produced by their use. The butter from the use of linseed cake had a rancid smell by the third or fourth day, while that from the consumption of oats, beans or decorticated cottonseed cake did not reach the same stage when kept in a warm part of the house till about ten

Eighth: That some foods produce butter which retains much more water than others; and butters which have a large percentage of water in them seem usually to be of second or third class quality. Only a few of the butters were tested for pure fat, and it is to be regretted that all were not, for it is evident that the percentage of water a butter contains not only determines its quality, but is also a necessary factor in accurately estimating the churnability of the fat in milk.
