PRICEVILLE. 2nd Day of The Show a Success.

Wednesday was far from an ideal Show day, and the only comfort on lookers had as they tightened up their great coats was that cold was better than rain. The attendance was very good and the entries in the various classes were numerous enough to make the results very interesting. We append the prize list for 2nd day.

The competition in the horse classes was keen, and lovers of the useful and ornamental in the equine line were gratified. C. C. James' special for single driver was won by Arch. McLean and the other prizes were well distributed among 17 other competitors.

The cattle classes contained some good animals, but good judges seemed to think the show in this line not up to the mark. In the Ayrshires A. Muir leads easily, and R. Oliver in the Devons.

When it comes to sheep at Priceville the show is one of great excellence, and competition close in Leicester and Fine Wool anyway. W. Meads in the Cotswolds has the most of it to himself. Nichol, Oliver, Geddes, Seeley, Muir are all well known breeders and prize winners with really good stock.

P. Muir's hobby, and a very useful one it is, is in Chester White Pigs, and he sweeps the list, doing well in the Berkshires also. W. Reid has two fine improved Yorkshires.

No township show and few county ones can excel Artemesia in the number of fowl exhibits, and intense interest is taken in the various breeds of barn door fowl and associates. We notice the name of S. Patterson first and last on the list and several times between. In vegetables and fowl Sam seems to be equally successful. J. Geddes captures all the Brown Leg horns, and the Houdans prizes go equally to C. Watson and A. Muir. The interest in fowl explains the excellence of the dozen of eggs in the hall for which there was no prize. They were beauties.

With such an excellent show it is a pity the day was marred as we have been informed by some exhibitors at night not on the programme.

The concert in quality and quantity was worthy of a better audience. A comic singer, Thos. A. Baker, of Toronto, was a good card, while the Johnston family, Priceville now known, are a host in themselves. Miss Watt, Mrs. Saunleron, Mr. W. Ramage, Mr. Paton are all good entertainers. Mr. Baker appeared four or five times, and some of the items of the others we give: Mr. Wm. Ramage, "The Man Behind the Plough" and "The Grave of Bonaparte." Misses Watt and Johnston, a duet "Just Tell Them That You Saw Me." Mr. Paton "The Kilty Lads." Miss Sanderson and Master Willie Johnston "Bring Back My Kitty to Me." Father and son Johnston gave an instrumental duet of great merit. The whole family thrilled the Scotch audience with "Scots who hae," and other popular pieces.
