ESSAY ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

God instituted the sacredness of the Sabbath at the creation for we are told in the Bible that He rested on that day and blessed and sanctified it, thus indicating that the day was to have a twofold aspect and a double blessing for man. By resting we recuperate our tired and worn bodies and by observing the day to keep it holy, in worshipping God we obtain the richest blessings for our souls. Therefore, it should be our greatest delight to observe this beneficent law of God. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy," but what do we find? Man in the perversity of his nature has gone far astray, casting aside all regards for and thought of God and the honor and obedience due to the Great Heavenly Father whose commands are all for our eternal wellbeing. We too must with shame and sorrow acknowledge ourselves to be in the category of those who transgress this law of God, for although we may not openly profane the day as some do, yet how far we come short in the spiritual observance of it in the "Not thinking our own thoughts or speaking our own words" and as parents in seeking to make it a day of delightful holiness for the children, which shall be golden and most blessed memories for them in after years, when they, in the middle of the burden and heat of the day in life's conflict shall pause and take retrospective glances back. Few more delightful visions have my own eyes beheld than the truly golden memories of glad and well spent Sabbaths. Let us then be earnest to improve the precious hours which will otherwise be spent walking about or playing and in other ways degrading the holy day. Let us gather our children around us to sing the songs of Zion, of which children are so fond; or in taking turns in reading some good interesting book, particularly Bunyan's Pilgrim's Progress with which our children are not so familiar as they should be; or engaging them in conversation or questioning them upon the Sabbath school Lesson. In these and similar ways the whole body of the afternoon may be most profitably and blessedly spent. I am well aware that this will entail a good deal of self-denial on the part of mothers, but how rich will the reward be? I am also deeply conscious of my own shortcomings in this matter, but will try with God's aid to follow more fully the dictates of conscience. Another way in which Christians might honor and sanctify that blessed day is by seeking to share its blessings with others not of our own household. For instance, we have all observed groups of young men availing themselves of the services of the priest and Levites. Have we, like the priest and Levites, let them by not caring for them; or like the good Samaritan shown an interest in them and in their wellbeing by offering them tracts or inviting them to accompany us to Church. How many souls might we not be the means of leading into the narrow way if we would but follow the Master more closely. It would require more courage, but we shall have strength if we ask for it. Let us take a lesson from the late saintly Mrs. Booth and many others among whom I might mention a daughter of the late Dr. Chalmers, who devoted her life to the lifting up of the drunken outcasts among whom she located herself that she might be a blessing to them.

This matter has troubled me for some time and I must plead very guilty in the process and Levite and unfortunately for the world almost the whole body of Christians are passing by on the other side. How much work there is to do and how little of it is being done. Truly the parable of the ten virgins is an accurate picture of Christ's Church. "They all slumber and slept" until the cry awoke them. Oh, Christian friends would it not be well for us to awake now and try in some way to persuade some soul or souls to be in readiness for the Bridegroom's coming. May God help us to consecrate ourselves more fully to the work of the Master.
