 when the G. T. R. changed its timetable
 on its roads west of us on account of

ELERION TRIALS.—The petition a-
 gainst Cochrane of Northumberland,
 McNeill of North Bruce has been con-
 sidered in his case, but R. Henry of S.
 Brant who defeated "Billy" Patterson
 has been unseated but not disqualified.
 The judges are making short work of
 the cases this year.
 —Hon Wilfred Laurier will not
 make himself more honorable by ac-
 cepting knighthood, still it he sees fit to
