ONTARIO EXPENDITURE

THE BILLS WHICH THE PROVINCE HAS TO MEET.

How Over Three Million Dollars Are Expended Annually—Some Large and Small for Various Public Services.

The estimated expenditure of the Province of Ontario for the year 1896 shows among others the following items:—

The total expenditure for the year is about three and a half millions of dollars.

For the services of gardeners and caretakers at Government House the sum of \$1,550 a year is paid by the Provincial Government.

The salaries of the secretary and messenger of the Lieutenant-Governor are paid by the Provincial Government and amount to about \$2,500 annually.

Premier Hardy receives \$7,000 a year and each of the other Provincial Ministers \$4,000 a year.

The total cost of running the Education Department for salaries and office expenses is about \$20,000 a year. The Attorney-General's Department costs about the same.

EARTHQUAKE IN ENGLAND

TWO DISTURBANCES OF GREAT SEVERITY EXPERIENCED.

A Wide Extent of Territory Affected—No Lives Lost—A Cathedral Damaged to Some Extent—A Woman Dies Fright.

Great Britain is in the throes of a genuine and unprecedented sensation. An earthquake, the most violent ever experienced in that country, has shaken every shire from Durham to Surrey, and from London to the Welsh coast.

The subterranean disturbance was first noticed at 5.30 on Thursday morning. It lasted from four to thirty seconds, and at many points two distinct shocks were experienced.

The most severe shocks were felt at Cheltenham, Ledbury and Dean Forest. The earth shaking was accompanied by a loud rumbling sound. Buildings were violently shaken, furniture was shifted, doors were thrown open, and pictures and other ornaments were upset.

The inhabitants were panic-stricken and fled from their houses in terror. The earthquake also was felt at Birmingham and various points in Shropshire and was violent in Worcester and the country surrounding that city. Houses rocked and furniture was overturned.

The shocks were followed by a tremor of the earth, and were accompanied by a RUMBLING SOUND.

At some points persons on the country roads, who were going to work, were thrown down, and a number of people were thrown out of their beds.

KILLED BY HIS WIFE'S SIN

NEW YORK MAN STRICKEN WITH APOPLEXY IN COURT.

He Fell to the Floor on Seeing His Wife in the Prisoners' Pen on Her Fourth Arrest for Drunkenness in Less than a Week—Died in Her Arms Soon After the Attack.

When a policeman of a New York police court opened the door of the pen in which the women prisoners awaiting examination were confined on Sunday morning and bade the inmates come out, a man who had been sitting in the front row of spectators' seats ever since the court opened rose to his feet, and with an anxious expression on his face examined the features of each woman who came forth. He was a tall, well-dressed man, with iron-gray hair, and his queer actions attracted the attention of a court officer, who strode forward, laid his hand on his shoulder, and asked him what was the matter.

"Oh, nothing," said the man, without even looking around.

"Well, you'll have to sit down," said the policeman.

The words were scarcely out of his mouth when the man suddenly threw up both hands, and, with a sob, fell to the floor. At the same time one of the women prisoners gave a shriek and made an attempt to dash through the gate which shut her from the spectators. She was restrained with difficulty, and when two policemen carried the unconscious man out into the hall she fell over in a faint.

Two hours later the man died in the woman's arms in the Flower Hospital. He never regained consciousness. After his death it required a number of the hospital attendants to get the woman away from the body. She became hysterical, and, tearing her hair and beating her breast, proclaimed herself the murderer of her husband.

The dead man was Theodore Lear, 49 years of age, a travelling salesman. The woman was his wife, Nellie, who the woman called herself her husband's murderer she rightly accused herself, the police think, for while the hospital records set forth that the man died of apoplexy, the attack, they believe, was brought on by the woman's conduct.

THE FIELD OF COMMERCE

Some Items of Interest to the Busy Business Man.

The Bank of Bengal has raised its discount rate from 8 to 9 per cent.

The net gold balance in the United States Treasury is \$132,700,000. The world's visible supply of wheat shows a decrease of nearly 5,000,000 bushels for the week.

Official returns of the crop of wheat in Great Britain place the yield 20,000,000 bushels in excess of 1895.

Total stocks of wheat at Toronto 178,205 bushels, as against 186,074 bushels last week and 60,896 bushels a year ago. It is estimated that Europe will require 70,000,000 bushels of wheat from the United States between this and July 31, 1897.

The grain trade in Ontario is very dull. Offerings are fair and prices are lower due to dullness of cables and erratic markets in the United States.

The visiting supply of grain in the United States and Canada is now 56,312,000 bushels, a decrease of 6,602,000 bushels for the week. A year ago the total was 63,786,000 and two years ago 85,930,000 bushels. The amount on passage to Europe is 32,960,000 bushels for the week. The total on passage a year ago was 25,760,000 bushels.

The Superintendent of the Government Telegraph Service is engaged in preparing for the extension of telegraph lines from Esquimaux Point, the present easterly terminus of the line on the north shore of the Gulf, to Belle Isle. In the course of the next year it is expected to add about 80 miles of line, which will connect the wires as far as Natisshuan, 600 miles below Quebec.

THE TRAIL OF BLOOD

One Day's String of Murders and Shooting Encounters in Chicago.

The twenty-four hours between Saturday and Sunday evenings were prolific of murders and fatal shooting encounters in Chicago.

During that time two men were murdered and the mutilated body of a third, supposed to have been assassinated, was found. Beside these, three men were shot and two of them fatally wounded during quarrels. A third is dying of a stab wound. Some of the guilty men are in the hands of the police, but the perpetrators of the most atrocious ones are still at large.

The list of killed and dying are as follows: William Johnson, bartender in the Park Hotel, shot and killed by Frank Casey, a well-dressed man, on Saturday morning.

Dominick Gill, city employee, missing since he drew his pay Friday, mutilated body found in the lake.

William Morris, alias Eli, 24 years old, shot and killed by Joseph Spiegel at 549 Clark street on Sunday night.

Patrick Casey, lodging-house habitué, stabbed Sunday morning in a street fight by James McMahon. At two o'clock on Monday morning the body of Casey was found in a gutter.

Luke Coyne, dying at the County Hospital from a bullet wound inflicted by the police believe, by James Donovan.

QUICK ENGINEERING

A quick piece of engineering work was carried out on Saturday night recently on the Great Eastern Railway, near Ely.

An old bridge of 108 feet span over the River Ouse was taken down in six hours and a new one was put in its place in two hours more.

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REPAIRS & PUBLIC WORKS

Government House uses \$650 worth of city water every year, \$1,350 worth of gas, \$2,200 worth of fuel, and repairs \$1,500 expended in repairs.

It costs \$27,000 a year to maintain the new Parliament Buildings in Toronto.

The fuel costs \$8,000 a year and repairs \$3,500.

Repairs & public buildings cost the province over \$200,000 this year. Over \$400,000 is paid annually towards Public and Separate school education. The inspection of Public school costs \$10,000 a year, and of Separate schools \$3,400 a year.

The Normal and Model schools in Toronto cost the Government \$25,000 a year. The Normal school at Ottawa costs about \$22,000 a year. The principal of each school draws \$2,500 a year.

The total cost to the Ontario Government of High schools and Collegiate Institutes is \$113,000 a year. There are two inspectors of High schools, who get a salary of \$2,500 each.

The School of Practical Science costs the Government of Ontario \$21,000 a year. The principal is paid \$2,800 salary.

For the maintenance of public institutions nearly \$800,000 is required yearly. Of this the Asylum for the Insane at Toronto costs \$97,000; at London \$130,000; at Kingston, \$70,000; at Brockville, \$113,000; at Mimico, \$71,000; at Brimley, \$42,000.

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
