NEWS FROM DAKOTA.—From an interesting letter received from Mr. John Cameron, Bottineau, Friday of last week, we call the following. Their winter began on 2nd Nov, but the weather was moderate in Dec. so far. His crop averaged 20 bus. per acre, and yielded 2000 bush of No. 1 hard. They have advanced machinery out there: one costing \$3000, is a self feeder, and self stacker, 20 horse power, 47 inch cylinder, 64 inch shoe, has 6 horse compound power to blow the straw through a large pipe, this pipe is moved at will to shape the stack. In our dusty barn what a godsend this would be to the man "behind the machine." He writes exuberantly of the good times under McKimley and sound money, the country is booming, wheat is 90 to 65c, a little lower than it was, but a paying price still. Glad to hear of the prosperity of former South Greysites, and hope the present ones will echo the same song before long within S. Grey's bounds. Mr. Cameron's Review dollar never lags.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—On Friday last Mr. Henry Wm. Jenkinson met his death in a painful and unlooked for manner. He and his only son Bonnet were in the woods and were sawing down a tree, on which was lodged an old dead maple. As the tree they were sawing gave way, each ran in opposite directions, but the father, who was not active on his feet, stumbled and fell and his son's last look of him showed him in the act of rising, and just too late, for the tree was upon him. He was killed outright, painless to him almost, through harrowing to his friends. The deceased and his family came to this country, from Staffordshire, Eng., in 1822. They buried two of their children in less than 3 weeks after landing, the remaining son had a long sickness but was mercifully spared. They came to Durham the following spring, rented a farm and were burnt out. They returned to England and came to Canada in 1829 settling where they are now at Christmas in 1891. He was a member of the Church of England, and in his 65th year. The funeral took place on Saturday to the Rocky graveyard. He leaves a widow one son and one daughter and these have the sincere sympathy of the community.
