TOWN COUNCIL. FIRST MEETING.

A Good Beginning.

On Monday last at 11 a. m. the members of the new Council took the declaration of office in the Town Hall, before Clerk Russell, and adjourned till 8 p. m. after appointing the Mayor, Reeve, Brown, Parker and McKechnie a distribution committee.

At 8 p. m., Council all present, business was resumed and after the reading of minutes, an order of business was adopted, and date of meeting agreed on. These are to be the first Monday of every month.

The Mayor then addressed the council, congratulating them on their position, and bespeaking for himself and them cordial co-operation. He then read an address outlining some important legislation for the benefit of the town which we give in full. We hope the program here outlined may be carried out successfully and our good town and district benefitted accordingly.

To the Town Council of the Town of Durham.

Gentlemen:

In welcoming you to your labors as members of the Town Council for 1897, I have much pleasure in bringing before you some measures which may engage your attention during the year.

1. Economy to a great extent will have to be our watch-word during the year, with a deficit of \$1800. to begin with it will be necessary to curtail expenditure as much as possible.

2. I think that a saving of at least \$100 can be effected by having our taxes paid direct to the Treasurer in two instalments say 1st of August and December.

3. I would strongly recommend that the different committees should consider the amount of their estimates for the year at as early a date as possible and submit to the Council, and that all expenditures should first receive the sanction of the Council and then be expended by public contract.

4. Believing that it is absolutely necessary for the interests of the town that some manufacturing industry should be started that would give employment to the unemployed in our town. I trust that each of you will assist individually and as a Council any well matured scheme which will work in this direction.

5. I would urge you to give your attention to the thorough organization of the Fire Brigade and appliances and see that the system is kept in as high a degree of efficiency as possible without extra expense, and that a strong and united effort should be made to induce the Fire Underwriters to grant a reduction in insurance rates.

Trusting to receive your cordial support in all measures which may be for the welfare and advancement of the Town morally, intellectually and materially, I am

Time to pay taxes was extended to first Monday in February.
The by-laws No's. 308 to 315 appointing to the following offices were read the required three times.
