A Roentgen ray surgical operation

It was finally determined to use the fluoroscope during the operation, the observer directing the movements from his observation of the coin, and metal instruments as they appeared on the fluoroscope screen. Thin boards were placed across two boxes and the patient

was placed under the Crookes tube.

The observer placed himself beneath and with the use of the new metallic screen of inch mesh definitely located the coin. The tube was then placed under the patient, and Dr. Zimmer proceeded to grasp the coin under the direction of the observer.

It was highly successful, the coin being removed after slipping once or twice from the forceps. The patient was under the influence of ether, and the observer saw every movement of the for-ceps. The patient is now considered out of danger.
