DISTRIBUTION OF SAMPLES FROM The Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa.

To the Editor of the Grey Review: During the past nine years, samples of those varieties of grain which have succeeded best on the Experimental Farm have been distributed on application in 3-lb. bags to farmers in all parts of the Dominion, free through the mail. The object in view in this distribution has been to add to the productiveness and improve the quality of these important agricultural products throughout the country by placing within reach of every farmer pure seed of the most vigorous and productive sorts. This work has met with much appreciation and a considerable degree of success.

Instructions have been given by the Hon. Minister of Agriculture to make a similar distribution this season. Owing to the very large number of applications now received it is not practicable to send more than one sample to each applicant, but with this limitation it is hoped that the stock available will be sufficient to permit of every farmer who so desires sharing in the benefits of this useful branch of the work of the Experimental Farms.

The distribution now in progress consists of some of the most promising sort of Oats, Barley, Spring Wheat, Pease, Field Corn and Potatoes. Requests for samples may be sent to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, at any time before the 1st of March, but after that date the lists will be closed so that the applications then on hand may be filled before seeding before seeding begins. All communications can be sent free of postage. It is desirable that each applicant should name the variety which he desires to test, also one or two alternative sorts in case the stock of the sort chosen should be exhausted, while no promise can be made that the variety asked for will be sent, the wishes of correspondents will be attended to as far as practicable. The samples of grain will be sent early but potatoes cannot be distributed until the danger of injury in transit by frost is over.

Bye, Russell.—That bill of G. B. Van Blaricom printing Financial Statements amt to \$10 be paid.—Carried.

McInnis.—Leith.—That D. R. O. be paid the sum of \$8.50 each divided as follows: D. R. O. \$4, use of house \$3, Poll Clerk \$1.50.—Carried.

McInnis.—Leith.—That the petition of Geo. Morrison and 31 others re the establishing a Union School between this Tp. and Normanby be laid over till next meeting of Council and the Clerk notify the Trustees of all School Sections affected by this petition.—Carried.

Jan. Allan reports on Calvert's bridge as follows, that approach requiring filling was frozen so solid, that it would be costly to break it up, but was perfectly secure till spring.

Bye.—Russell.—That foregoing report be adopted and Mr. Allan receive \$1 for his services.—Carried.

McInnis.—Russell.—That R. Burrows be paid \$2.10 in payment of goods furnished, ed to Jno. Klohes.—Carried.

Bye.—Leith.—That the reeve and mover consult Mrs. Tribe re John Klohes and report to this Council.—Carried.

Said committre reports as follows:—That Mrs. Tribe had agreed to keep Jno. Klohes for \$150 per week. Leith.—McInnis.—That foregoing report be adopted and the reeve attend to the same.—Carried.

Russell.—Leith.—That the Council give the scab timber on Base line opposite G. A. Con, 14 to P. Thair.—Carried.

Leith.—McInnis.—In consideration of the acct. sent us by Clerk of Normanby we remit \$4 with statement from Clerk.—Carried.

McInnis.—Leith.—That W. Wilder be allowed the sum of \$1.25 per week for the maintenance of Wm. Williams from this

date, and that the clerk notify W. Wilder to that effect and if he refuse to accept this amt then W. Williams will be removed to Mrs. Tribes.—Carried.

Russell.—McInnis.—That the Clerk notify Alex. Doulos that he give no more flour to A. Bogle, as indigent, on this Tp.—Carried.

Russell.—McInnis.—That Mrs. Barclay be supplied as formerly viz. 40 lbs. flour and \$1 in goods per mth.—Carried.

Bye.—McInnis.—That the petition of Rev. J. M. Miller and 11 others re Mrs. Kopecko, indigent, be granted and this Council made a special grant of \$4 to her.—Carried.

Leith.—Russell.—That Chas. Ramage receive the sum of \$5 bal, on printing acct also \$6c. for postage.—Carried.

McInnis.—Leith.—That the reeve examine Registry office re Treasurer's securities and report to Council at next meeting.—Carried.

Bye.—Russell.—That the Clerk be paid 25c. express charges on ballots.—Carried.

Russell.—Leith.—That Council now adjourn till Feb. 13th to receive the Auditors' report; leaders for printing, appointing an assessor, and Pathma-ters for 1897.—Carried.
