IMPROVE THE TOWN.

As we promised last week we intend to devote a little space to the above topic taking the Richmond Dispatch, furnished us by Mr. Wm. Johnston as a kind of a text.

This paper at the beginning of the year was used by several prominent citizens to discuss the possibility of increasing the prosperity of Richmond, and while some of the methods are not applicable to us, many of them are, and we produce the substance of some of these.

Nearly all of them say "we must increase the number of our manufacturing establishments, as our future growth depends on this." Durham is similarly situated. We have little to hope for from an increased Agricultural development, and only by generously encouraging manufacturing can we hope to grow. This encouragement might be shown by granting tax exemption, and giving a free site, to either home or foreign manufacturers who mean business.

Another point, Durham should have better facilities for transportation. If the electric railway would materialize it would give a better standing and prestige to Durham.

"Let the people of all classes encourage home enterprises of all kinds," instead of sending away for so many of the articles of merchandise daily required. Many mail orders must be sent to the city stores judging by the number of catalogues passing through the post office, and the market train on Saturday not infrequently carries away money which should be spent in Durham.

"Induce every citizen to speak favorably of the town and its citizens." Did you ever know Durhamites to do otherwise? Did you? Fellow-citizens, let us incline our hearts to observe this practice.

"A large number of small enterprises rather than a few large ones to begin with." "Adding to the wealth of the well-to-do, the rich, increases their ability and desire to purchase in other than home markets, adding to the purchasing power of many, the poor will increase the number of customers for your home markets."

These are a few of many suggestions offered, there no doubt many more suggestions might be offered, which if acted upon would result in good all round. Suppose we have a little talk on this matter, by giving us some letters containing suggestions how to improve the town. The pages of the REVIEW are at the service of our citizens, and our council might in this indirect way receive some hints.

In connection with this subject we have selected an article on the same line which may give further suggestions. See page 8, last column.
