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Newspaper Laws.
We call the special attention of Postmasters and subscribers to the following synopsis of the newspaper laws:
1. If any person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether it be taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until payment is made.
2. Any person who takes a paper from the post office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not is responsible for the pay.
3. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time, and the publisher continues to send, the subscriber is bound to pay for it if he takes it out of the post office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.

THE HOME.

THE SUMMER SEWING.
To some it may seem almost too early to mention the summer sewing, but for the woman with much of it to do, now is the time to commence. There are several good reasons for beginning thus early and prominent among them is time. There is always so much other work on the farm later in the season that the sewing may have to be neglected. Then there is usually a sale during this month of linens and muslins, and one may be able to make some good sections and also strike some bargains. The weather, too, being cold, makes it pleasant for work. Of course there are not as yet any of the new and pretty dress patterns for next summer, but such sewing may be left till later. It is principally the muslin underwear, the kitchen dresses, the flannel and calico shirts for the boys' everyday wear, and like garments which may be made now. It is necessary before one does any buying to take an inventory, so to speak, of what one has in the way of summer clothing, and then make a list of what one needs. It is then very easy to find out how much of everything one must have. If the family is a big one it is by far the cheapest to buy a bolt of muslin. If a good quality is procured it may do for both underwear and bedding. All the lace, embroidery, thread, needles, buttons, etc., which may be needed should be bought at the same time, and with good patterns of all garments to be made one will not be unnecessarily interrupted after once commencing operations. If a seamstress is hired to do the work have everything ready and comfortable for her, so that she will not have to waste her time in doing such things which could have been done for her.
Before commencing to sew at all it is the very best plan to cut out all the garments first, pinning the pieces which belong together into little bundles. By doing this one may sit down to the machine and run up seam after seam without interruption. After all the garments are cut and folded one may clear away all pieces and sit in a neat, clean room. One may save time by sewing all the seams which can be run upon the machine first, and then baste, hem or shirr afterward, leaving all the hand work till last. Then a garment may be picked up at an odd moment and the finishing touches put on. It may seem unnecessary to mention that a good light when working is absolutely essential. The machine should be moved near a window for the time being, at least.
The woman who has all of her own work to do and a number of children to sew for cannot be expected to make fancy garments for them, trimmed elaborately with lace and embroidery. The fussier they are the more work it is to wash and iron. No one cares to make work, yet a narrow edging of lace, put on smoothly, cannot make such a difference in the ironing, but it does in the appearance. If unadorned muslin is used for everyday wear something nicer should be made up for best. If all the garments cannot be trimmed, have one or two pretty sets. Strong lace and embroidery is very cheap, and very often the girls enjoy crocheting their own lace, which is exceptionally durable if made of crochet cotton. The narrow novelty braids make such a neat finish for seams, when stitched on smoothly. For men's and boys' nightshirts, it is very pretty. When used for these the braid has blue or red featherstitching or figures in it, but for women's clothing nothing but the pure white should be used.
The nicest way of making petticoats for women is to gore them sharply and sew a wide ruffle around the bottom. There will then be no bulging or sagging about the hips. This ruffle should reach to the knee. If the trimming is put on the rufflet is not so apt to catch on the heels or on the shoe buttons and be torn. The skirt for little folks are simply straight widths bunched at the bottom and gathered into a band at the top. They are so short that ruffles are not necessary to protect the trimming. The underwaists for little folks cost from 25 to 50 cents apiece, and may be made for much less. There is a very heavy white drilling, which is splendid for that purpose and costs but 20 or 25 cents a yard. One yard will make two or more waists. They are cut without sleeves and very low in the neck, buttoning in the back. A two-inch band of the material should be stitched around the waist line so as to make it double there. Then if two rows of flat bone buttons are sewed on the clothes may be buttoned on, and no fear of there being too much strain or weight as there would be with but one button.
The dresses worn about the kitchen and where a woman must be plain and yet neat. The old "Mother Hubbard" style is abominable for many reasons. One is that no woman looks well in it, and another is that it is most unkind to work in, being too full. A close fitting waist buttoning in front, with a skirt not too long, gathered to it, is best. If the sleeves are short so much the better. There may be a frill of white around the neck, which will make the gown quite pretty. Calico, especially the blue and white, and the old-fashioned seersucker, are the best materials for summer kitchen dresses. The skirts of old cotton dresses of which the waists are worn out make very good kitchen aprons, and are economical, too. It takes but a short time to run up the hems and sew them to bands, when lo! there are aprons which pay well for the trouble.

OVER THE KITCHEN FIRE.
Haricot Beans—In boiling do not put in the salt till the beans are nearly cooked, otherwise they are apt to split and crack. Prepare as follows: Soak one pint of haricot beans all night, put them in fresh water, bring slowly to the boil, and simmer till tender. Drain the beans dry, add two ounces of butter, a tablespoonful of minced parsley, pepper and salt to taste. Keep moving the steapen over the fire with-out a spoon, as this would break the beans. When the ingredients are thoroughly mixed squeeze in the juice of half a lemon and serve very hot.
A Mutton Stew—Take two or three pounds of the breast or neck of mutton, cut the meat off the bones in square pieces, place the meat in a saucapen with one ounce of dripping, cook till

TERMS OF AGREEMENT
BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADIAN GOVERNMENTS.
How the Live Stock May be Moved From Canada to the U. S. and From the U. S. to Canada.
The agreement between the United States Secretary of Agriculture and the Canadian Minister of Agriculture relating to the quarantine of animals between the United States and Canada provides that:
1. Each country shall accept the veterinary certificates of the other. 2. That the chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States and the chief inspector of stock for Canada will mutually inform one another of any outbreak of contagious animal disease in either country, or of disease in animals imported from either country. 3. A ninety-days' quarantine shall be enforced by both countries upon all cattle imported from Europe or from any country in which contagious pleuropneumonia is known to exist; a fifteen days' quarantine shall be enforced upon all ruminants and swine imported from countries in which foot and mouth disease has existed within six months, and upon all swine imported from all other countries.
Breeding cattle admitted to this country must be accompanied by a certificate that they have been subjected to the tuberculin test, and found free from tuberculin, otherwise they shall be detained in quarantine one week and subjected to the tuberculin test. All cattle found tuberculous must be returned to the country whence shipped, or slaughtered without compensation.
CATTLE FOR FEEDING
or stocking ranches must be accompanied by certificate showing that they are free from any contagious disease, and that (excepting tuberculous) no such disease existed in the district whence they came.
Cattle in transit will be admitted at any port of the United States and Canada in bond, or in bond for exportation by sea from any Canadian port, or from Portland, Boston and New York, to the United States. No animals covered by this memorandum may be placed on board cars till the litter from previous loads has been removed and the car thoroughly cleaned and disinfected. Inspectors may cause such work to be done at the expense of the railway company, or prohibit the use of the cars until it is done.
Sheep may be admitted subject to inspection at Port of entry and accompanied by an official certificate that sheep scab has not existed in the district where they have been fed within six months. If disease exists in any of them they may be returned or slaughtered. Sheep may be admitted for transit, in bond, from one port to another in either country, and if for slaughter they may be admitted without inspection. Subject to inspection at shipping port, they may be admitted into either country for transit to any shipping port in Canada, for export by sea, or to the United States for export from Portland, Boston and New York.
SWINE MAY BE ADMITTED
without inspection for slaughter in bonded cars bonded slaughter houses or when forming part of a settler's effects and accompanied by a certificate that swine plague or hog cholera has not existed within six months in the district whence they came. Lacking such certificate they must be inspected at port of entry, and, if diseased, will be slaughtered without compensation.
Horses may be admitted from one port to another in either country without inspection at the shipping port. Horses may be admitted for racing, show, or breeding purposes on inspection at port of entry. Horses may be admitted for temporary stay, teaming, or pleasure driving at points along the frontier for a period not exceeding one week, upon permit of customs officer, should he observe any evidence of disease he will detain the animals and report to the district inspector, who will decide whether the animals may be admitted, and horses used for driving or riding to or from points in Manitoba, North-west Territories or British Columbia on business connected with stock raising or mining, and horses belonging to Indian tribes may be admitted without inspection, but must report to customs officers both going and coming. Under all other circumstances horses must be inspected at port of entry.

WHOLE FAMILY GONE MAD.
A whole family of the name of Cunningham has suddenly gone mad at Skibbereen, County Cork. The two brothers tried to murder their three sisters one morning, but were bound and taken to the lunatic asylum. In the afternoon the sisters showed signs of homicidal mania, and next day their first cousin went mad, and was also shut up. They are quiet, well-to-do farming people and very pious. It is a strange coincidence that last March a Cunningham family in County Roscommon, father, daughter and three sons, all of excellent reputation, roared to death an elder brother through religious mania.

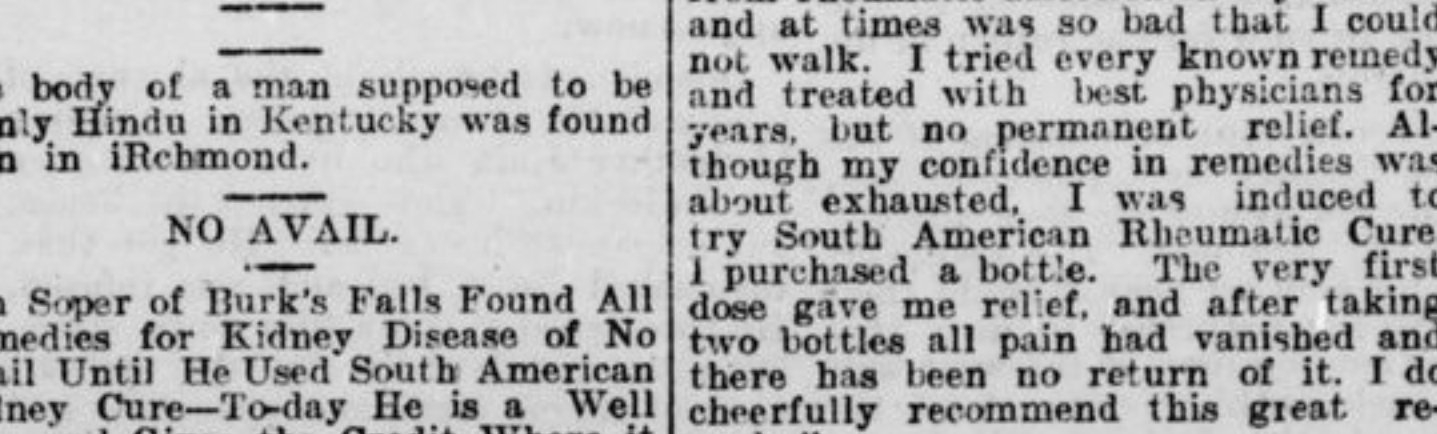
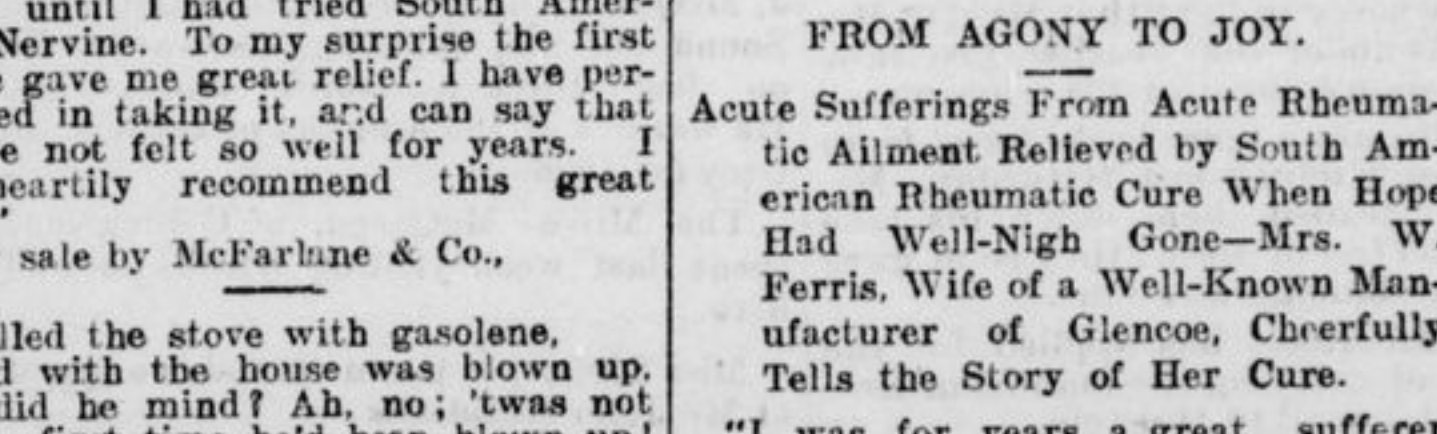

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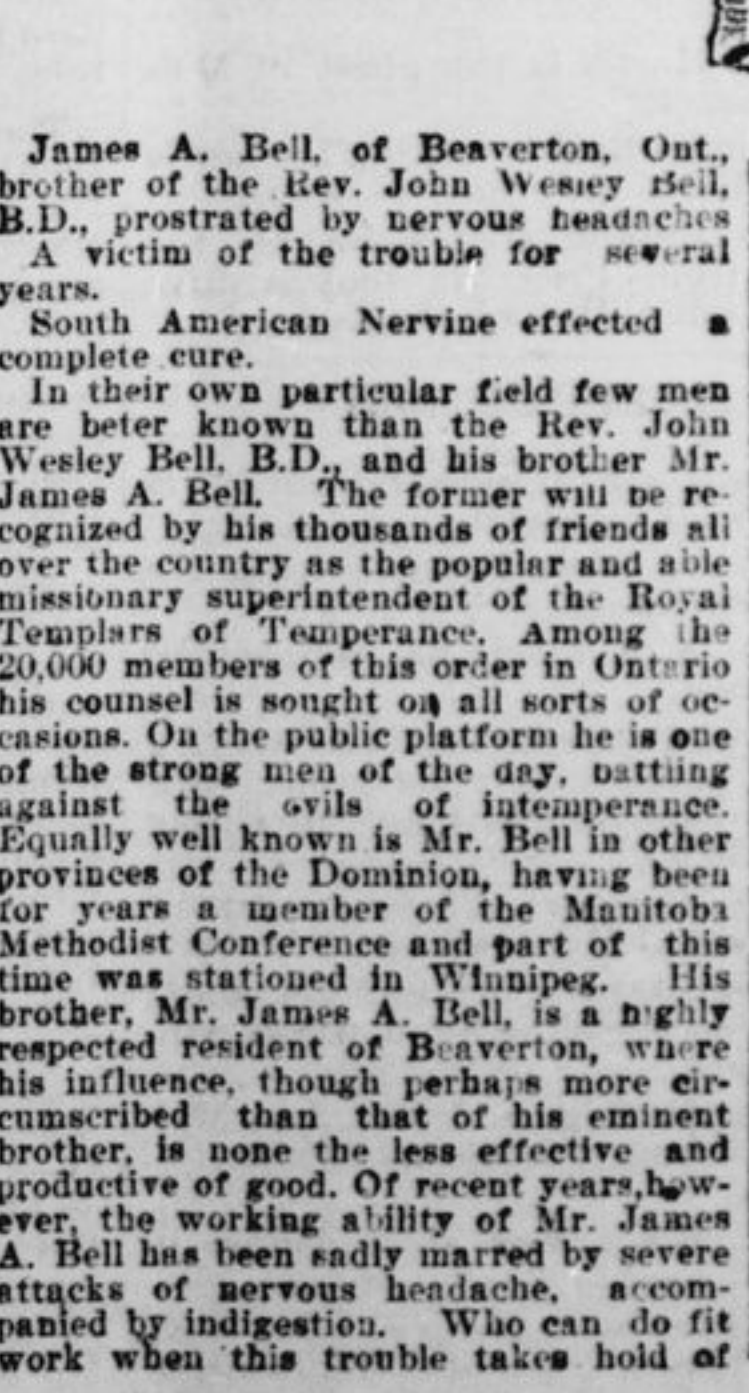
