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THE TEXT OF THE TREATY BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND GREAT BRITAIN.

Details of the Agreement-Made to settle all Disputes-How the Arbitrators are to be chosen.

The preamble expresses the desire of Great Britain and the United States to consolidate the relations of amity happily existing between them, and to consecrate by treaty the principle of international arbitration.

Article I.-The parties agree to arbitrate, subject to this treaty, all questions in difference which they may fall and adjust themselves by diplomatic negotiations.

Article II.-All pecuniary claims or groups of claims, which in the aggregate do not exceed \$100,000 in amount and do not involve the determination of territorial claims, shall be dealt with and decided by an arbitration tribunal constituted as provided for in the following articles.

Article III.-Each party shall nominate one arbitrator, who shall be a jurist of repute, and the two arbitrators so nominated shall, within two months of their nomination, select an umpire. In the event of their failing to do so within the limit of time, the umpire shall be appointed by agreement between the members of the Supreme Court of the United States and the members of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council of Great Britain.

Each nominating body shall act by a majority. In case they fail to agree upon an umpire within three months, the umpire shall be selected in the manner provided for in Article X. The person so selected shall be president of the tribunal. The award of a majority of the members shall be final.

PECUNIARY CLAIMS.

Article IV.-All pecuniary claims or groups of claims exceeding \$100,000, and all other matters in respect whereof either of the parties shall have rights against the other under the treaty or otherwise, provided they do not involve territorial claims shall be decided by the tribunal constituted as follows:-

Article V.-Any subject of arbitration described in Article IV, shall be submitted to the tribunal provided for in Article III, the award whereof, if unanimous, shall be final. If not unanimous either party may within six months from the date of the award demand a review thereof. In such case the matter in dispute shall be submitted to an arbitration tribunal consisting of five jurists of repute, no one of whom has been a member of the tribunal whose award is to be reviewed, and who shall be selected thus, namely, two by each party, one to act as umpire, by these four and to be chosen within three months from nomination. Failing to choose in time, the umpire shall be appointed by agreement of the nominating bodies in Article III. In case they do not agree upon an umpire within three months of the date applied to by the parties the umpire shall be selected as in Article X, the person so selected to be president. The award of a majority shall be final.

Article VI.-Any controversy involving the determination of territorial claims shall be submitted to a tribunal of six members, three of whom, subject to the judgment of Article VIII, shall be judges of the Supreme Court, or justice of circuit courts, to be nominated by the President of the United States. The other three members shall be judges of the British Supreme Court, or members of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, to be nominated by the Queen. Their award by a majority of not less than five to one shall be final. If there is less than the prescribed majority the award shall also be final, unless either party within three months protests that the award is erroneous. If the award is protested or if the members of the tribunal are equally divided, there shall be no recourse to hostile measures of any description until the mediation of one or more friendly powers shall have been invited by one or the other party.

Article VII.-Objections shall not be made to the jurisdiction of the tribunal except thus: If before the close of the hearing of the claim the tribunal shall decide upon the motion of either party, that the determination of the claim of necessity involves a decision of a disputed question of principle of grave general importance affecting the national rights of such party as distinct from its private rights, of which it is merely an international representative, the jurisdiction of the tribunal shall cease and the same shall be dealt with by arbitration under Article VI.

Article VIII.-Where the question involved concerns a particular State or territory of the United States the President may appoint a judicial officer of such State to be one of the arbitrators. Similarly in the case of a British colony Her Majesty may appoint an officer thereof to be one of the arbitrators.

Article IX.-Territorial claims shall include all claims to territory and all other claims involving questions of servitude, rights of navigation, access to fisheries and all rights and interests necessary to control the enjoyment of either's territory.

Article X.-If the nominating bodies designated by Articles 3 and 5 do not agree upon an umpire the latter shall be appointed by the King of Sweden. Here follows a paragraph which the Chronicle is unable to furnish accurately. It seems to provide for the withdrawal of the treaty in the event of either party notifying the other that changes in existing conditions make withdrawal desirable. For each party paying its own counsel and arbitrators, but in the event of essential matters of difference it is the right of either party to receive disavowals or apologize for acts of the other not resulting in substantial pecuniary injury, the tribunal finally disposing of the matter direct whether the unsuccessful party bears any other expenses.

Article XI.-The time and place of meeting and all questions of procedure shall be decided by the tribunal itself.
