THE DUTY OF THE HOUR.

An informal meeting of the business men of the town was held in the Town Hall, Tuesday evening, to take into consideration the steps necessary to secure as soon as possible the establishment of an industry or industries here to give employment to the working classes of the town, too many of whom are now out of employment.

Mr. G. McKechnie was voted to the chair and outlined the situation as above. Mayor Calder and Messrs Crawford, Jas. Brown, H. Parker, K. McFarlane and others all gave their opinions freely as to the necessity of something being done to relieve the present situation.

All were agreed on these lines, but of course differences of opinion were to be expected when it came to say just what should be done.

A Chair or Furniture factory, Box Factory, Carriage and Waggon factory and other industries were spoken of. Some would like to begin on a small scale others with stronger faith would launch out.

Then again what shape should encouragement or assistance take? Mr. McKechnie showed clearly bousing was out of the question, the only public assistance possible being to grant exemption from taxes, and if possible give a free site.

The Mayor believes that \$5000 could be raised privately and offered to capitalists with twice that amount or more, under proper guarantees, to establish something.

To arrive at some conclusion a committee consisting of the Mayor, G. McKechnie, H. Parker, J. W. Crawford, Reeve Sparling, and Jas. Brown were appointed to formulate some scheme and call a meeting of the citizens at an early date to discuss it and take action.

The duty of the hour is for every ratepayer to be public spirited enough to accept the finding of the majority loyally. We cannot all get what we want, but all will be benefited if a hearty loyal agreement be arrived at.

The tone of the meeting was excellent and we hope subsequent steps will show that the town is awake to its interests by supporting in every legal and moral way possible the effort to keep our population with us and at the same time attract others to take advantage of our portion and resources.
