PERFUMED BUTTER.

Perfumed butter on the dinner table is the latest fad of wealthy people in London. The dairies where this butter is made are as odorous as a florist's shop or the laboratory of a perfumer. In the first place the butter is made in small pats like those in ordinary use. Each pat is wrapped in a bit of fine muslin and placed on a bed of rose leaves specially prepared in an earthen jar. On top another layer of the fresh and delicate rose leaves is placed before the jar is filled with a solid chunk of ice. Then the jar is placed in a refrig-erator and allowed to remain there for 10 hours, when the pats are ready for




