Met at Elmwood on Monday the 8th inst. Members all present. Minutes of January Meeting read and passed. Committee on Treasurer's Sureties reported the same as good and satisfactory. The Auditor's Report for the year 1896 was accepted and passed and 200 Copies of the same ordered to be printed and the Auditor's paid their Salary of \$8.00 each. Duncan McKinnon was reappointed Assessor for the current year at a Salary of \$75.00 for all services as Assessor. The tender of the Hanover "Post" for printing was accepted. The Clerk was ordered to notify Patmasters, Pound Keepers and Fence Viewers of this appointment. Mr. Kilmer was allowed right of way to erect Telephone poles on concession 2 & 3 W. G. R., from Aberdeen to Hutton's Hill thence on gravel road to Durham, ordered that a By-law be prepared and passed at next meeting of Council to be held at Allan Park on 25th day of May next to allow the Kilmer Co. to put up Electric light poles on Aberdeen Side Road and on Garafra Road to Durham—Parties objecting to this being done to let their objections be known at that meeting. The Collector was allowed a rebate of \$87 05 in 1895, Roll being an error of Taxes on personal property of Goodeve Estate in 1892 and returned to County. Widows Reid and Briggs' Taxes for 1896 were ordered to be remitted. Cheques were issued to Mrs. Finerty and James Smith for \$8 00 their quantity allowance as Indigents.
