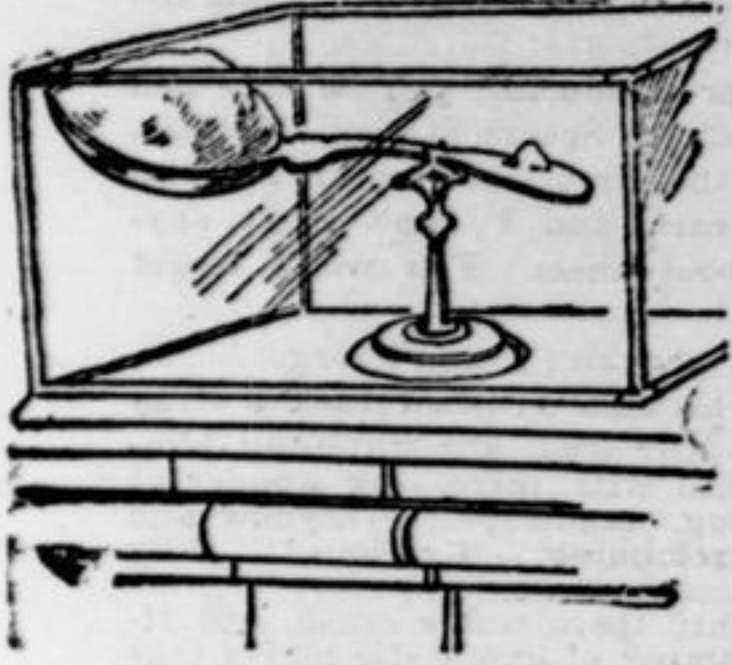

Mr. Taylor is a thoroughly educated man, and uses beautiful language. He speaks with the greatest ease, and although he is not possessed of a captivating voice, you can't help but admire his earnestness his convincing arguments, and his great flow of oratory. His address Sunday night, on "That Boy of Yours," was more on the line of morality than temperance and during the two hours of its delivery his vast audience was held spell bound.

TOWN COUNCIL.—At Monday's meeting a by-law was introduced by Mr. Brown granting exemption from taxation for 6 years to anyone building a house, etc. of the value of \$700. The committee on town industries got authority to advertise in Toronto papers offering free site and exemption from taxes to light manufacturers. An extra inducement will be held out to capitalists by offering them from 30 to 50 per cent of the money they will put up. This to be obtained by private subscription.

WITH THE BAPTISTS.—The Teameeting in the Town Hall last Friday evening was a success even under adverse conditions. Mr. Russell was the only advertised speaker present, but he is a host in himself, and gave his address which has been highly spoken of wherever given "Men Wanted."

Mr. Tompkins spoke on "Church and Union" in an excellent way. Pastor McGregor himself has always been a useful, yet editors had their say, and the music was pleasing and appropriate. About \$30 was realized. Dr. Jamieson made an excellent chairman.

Ramage, late of the Priceville Courier will address the audience, while Durham choir will furnish excellent music.

The following clipping from the St. Thomas Times, N. Brunswick, will be read with interest by all who know the Rev. Mrs. Jas. Hamilton (Mary Brown). "Wednesday morning at 2.30 o'clock, Mrs. Jas. Hamilton passed away at her home nine miles south west of this city, after a brief illness. She was a young lady of splendid character, and was much loved by those who knew her. Besides a husband she leaves a baby only a few days old that will never know a mother's tender care, to mourn her sudden and unexpected demise. She was 23 years of age. Rev. Hart, of Hoople, conducted a short funeral service Wednesday afternoon at her late residence and the remains brought to St. Thomas and taken by the husband to Holstein, Ont., for burial."

FIRE.—The residence of Mrs. Boulden to the west of the town was burned Tuesday last at 8 a. m. Being out of reach of the engine the brigade had to depend on hooks, buckets and ladders and succeeded in saving a storehouse and woodshed only a few feet away after hot work. The house was occupied by Mrs. Boulden, Sr., and her daughter-in-law. The latter was out milking, when the fire was discovered, some neighbors soon gathered, and succeeded in saving the chief furniture upstairs and all body clothing was however destroyed. Much sympathy is expressed for the ladies, as the loss is considerable notwithstanding insurance. A defective stovepipe is supposed to be the cause.

—We are to have a Dominion plebiscite this year. Why? To ascertain public opinion on the liquor traffic. Really we cannot see that the expense of a plebiscite is justified if so little result is to follow as we have just seen in the bill introduced into the local house. Temperance people have reason to feel aggrieved that a measure more in accordance with the large majority obtained at the provincial plebiscite is not forthcoming. Circulars have been issued calling a Convention in Toronto on March 11th and the prospects are it will be numerously attended.

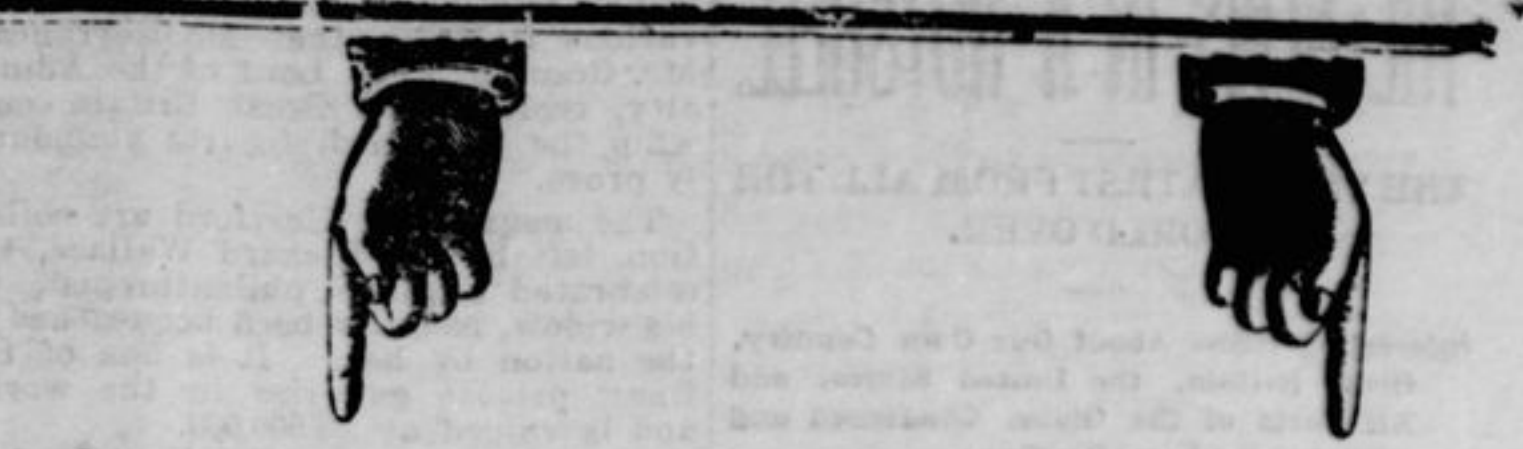
