BOARD OF HEALTH MEETING,

Health, the Mayor in the chair, it was resolved that the attention of house holders in the town of Durham, and all others whom it may concern should be directed to the following provisions in the Board of Health Act.

1st That no persons shall offer for sale as food any meat, fish. fruit, vegetables, milk or other articles of food, which by reason of disease or any other cause shall be unfit for use.

2nd All wells shall be cleaned out and wells unfit for use shall be filled up by the owners of the premises.

3rd No persons shall deposit or permit the deposit upon any lot belonging to him, or deposit upon or into any street square, lane, pond, river, stream or water any manure or other refuse or vegetable or animal matter or other

4th No privy vault, cesspool or reser-voir, water closet, stable or sink shall be established until the details thereof shall have been submitted to Board of Health and the approval of the Board obtained thereto in writing 5th All privies, closets and out houses

of all kinds must be cleaned and thoroughly disenfected before the 15th day of May and thereafter once a month two pounds of sulphate of cop-per to two pails of water may be used as a disinfective.

6th Every householder and every hotel and restaurant keeper shall dispose of all garbage, house swill, etc., etc., by burning or by its regular removal twice a week or in any other way santioned by the Board of Health,

7th No hog shall be kept between the 15th day of May and the 1st day of November within the limits of the town except in pens 70 feet from any houre, and regularly cleaned and dis-


