

HOUSE PLANTS

The woman who complains that she too much, is not always heedful of their. need of water, permits the room they sit in to become very cold at night and then very hot during the day. Probably, too, she does not cover them up at night, nor in any way protect them from dust. A sudden chill often blasts an otherwise hearty plant, and just as important is it to protect them from superfluous dust, When cleaning day comes pushing through Dublin streets. around, throw big bags of old muslin or dimity over the green things, and as plants are usually kept in a deep window, be sure at night to draw down the shades and cover the portieres when the gas is lighted. The portieres should be of some heavy, dark stuff to keep out the light, heat, and possibly, tobacco smoke. Before leaving the room for the night, one window, as distant as possible from that in which the plants sit cought to be roulled down. the closed curts as will still keep them warm enough. Then, not until she has made her fire, cleaned the grate and done her dusting for the day, should the maid push back the portieres and pull up the window shades.


